Title I, Part A is a federally funded program under the Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA) of 1965. The purpose of Title I under the ESEA is to ensure that all children have a fair, equal, and significant opportunity to obtain a high-quality education and reach, at a minimum, proficiency on challenging state academic achievement standards and state academic assessments.

RCSS Title I Programs

- ⇒ **School-wide Program:** A Title I Schoolwide program is a comprehensive reform strategy design to upgrade the entire educational program in a Title I school. It allows the school to address the educational needs of all children so every student achieves high levels of academic proficiency. Schoolwide programs allow staff in schools to redesign their entire educational program to serve all students. The emphasis in Schoolwide program schools is on serving all students, improving all structures that support student learning, and combining all resources, as allowed, to achieve a common goal.
- ⇒ **Neglected & Delinquent:** This program is designed for the prevention and intervention of children and youth who are neglected, delinquent or at risk.
- ⇒ **Migrant Education Program (MEP):** Supportive services are provided to reported migrant children. MEP projects operate in coordination with the regular school programs.
- ⇒ **Transition Specialist:** A transition specialist is on site at Tubman Education Center to ensure that students transition back to their zoned schools with minimal disruptions.

RCSS Title I Programs

- ⇒ **District Level Parental Involvement/Engagement:** District level Parent Facilitators and Title I Program Specialist offer monthly Professional Learning Sessions for parents. The engaging informative workshops afford parents the opportunity to build capacity for the involvement in their child(ren) academic journey. A Parent Resource Center is open Monday - Friday from 8:00 AM—5:00 PM at the Central Office with a wealth of technology and materials for parents to use.
- ⇒ **Parent Involvement/Engagement in ALL Title I schools:** An active parental involvement program is in operation at all Title I schools. The program is designed to strengthen and expand the requirements for involving the parents of Title I students. These requirements assist with ensuring parent consultation, participation, and involvement within the Title I program by engaging the parents in meaningful activities to assist them in strengthening their skills to help their child(ren) reach academic success.
- ⇒ **Parent Facilitators:** Facilitators are in most Title I schools for the purpose of promoting parental involvement.
- ⇒ **Surplus Computer Program:** Parents of students in high poverty schools are given the opportunity to take computer skills classes. The parents are given a restored surplus computer upon completion of the classes. Computers are restored by students under the directions of a teacher.

RCSS Title I Programs

- ⇒ **Instructional Coaches/Academic Support Specialists:** Provide instructional support through effective professional learning to improve all aspects of academic programs; collaborate with colleagues in meeting the mission, goals, and educational objectives of the district's educational program; identify program needs and work with instructional staff; include all teachers in all professional learning; support the implementation of the CCGPS.
- ⇒ **Extended Instructional Programs:** Various extended instructional programs are offered in Title I schools to enrich and enhance academic skills to promote student growth.
- ⇒ **Support for Homeless Children in Title I and Non-Title I Schools:** Support is provided due to a lack of permanent, safe, and stable living conditions from extreme poverty. Services are provided to all students (K-12). For more information contact Linda Heggs at 706-826-1129.
- ⇒ **Private Schools:** Services are rendered to private schools for students who live in Title I eligible attendance areas when requested.
- ⇒ **Intervention Specialists:** Intervention Specialists assist in improving student performance in Middle and High schools. They are actively involved with parents and in reaching the most at-risk students.
