School and Community

Tutt Middle School was named for Mr. John McClinton Tutt, a Mathematics teacher and coach at Lucy C. Laney High School. Mr. Tutt was not only an excellent teacher, but he enjoyed the distinction of being one of the best coaches of his time. An article published in the local newspaper characterized Mr. Tutt as being a noted football official, probably the oldest coach in the South, and the first Black to referee a college football game. Mr. Tutt dedicated fifty years of his life to educating students. Originally there were only ten classrooms in the school, and it was built to accommodate 300 students for grades one through eight. In 1966, Tutt became a 1st through 12th grade school, with the first graduating class receiving their high school diplomas in 1969. Since the early 80's Tutt has been a middle school housing sixth, seventh, and eighth graders. Tutt is located in Augusta, the second largest and oldest city in Georgia. Augusta is best known as the Garden City and home of the Masters Golf Tournament. RCSS operates 58 schools and serves over 30,000 students. RCSS has an International Baccalaureate Program, Top-rated Magnet Schools and Programs, specialized curricula such as STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics), arts infusion, and technology rich classrooms.

General Information

At John M. Tutt Middle School, we pride ourselves in providing our students with a solid and purposeful education that integrates learning across the curriculum, from the latest technologies to new methods for instruction. Tutt Middle provides core instruction in English, Science, Social Studies and Math. In addition, classes in Physical Education, Health, Music, Band and Business Technology are offered. We are proud to offer Advanced Courses to accelerate high school credit accumulation, some of our students can earn Carnegie Units in Algebra I and Physical Science. Special programs offered at John M. Tutt Middle School include the Gifted Program for academically advanced students. Currently our schedule is organized to include 60 minutes for each content area and connections. In addition to the regular connections classes, students in need of additional help in reading and math are assigned to support classes. Students are able to participate in a variety of extracurricular activities and join a variety of sports teams. There is something for everyone at John M. Tutt Middle, where we pride ourselves in educating the whole child, and we strive to make our students college and career ready.

College and Career Ready Performance Index (CCRPI)

College and Career Ready Performance Index (CCRPI) is Georgia's statewide accountability system. The CCRPI assesses how well students are prepared for college and careers and ensures that schools are focused on improving achievement among all students. The index measures progress on indicators such as content mastery, student attendance, and preparation for the next school level. Schools earn CCRPI points based on indicators that vary by grade and school level and align with measures of college- and career-readiness. Schools may earn up to a set number of points in three main categories, for a total of 100 possible points.
