**\*Write your words on a Magna Doodle or Etch-a-Sketch.**

**\*Mold your words using play-dough.**

**\*Type your words in fancy letters on the computer.**

**\*Spell your words from letters cut out of magazines.**

**\*Make up a cheer for each word.**
