Langford World Middle School was named for Rupert Langford, the chairman of the Richmond County Board of Education in the 1940s who died at age 41 in September 1950. Augusta is best known as the Garden City and home of the Masters Golf Tournament. Since the early 1980s, Langford has been a middle school housing sixth, seventh, and eighth graders.

OUR CCRPI STATS:

College and Career Ready Performance Index (CCRPI) is Georgia's statewide accountability system. The CCRPI assesses how well students are prepared for college and careers and ensures that schools are focused on improving achievement among all students. The index measures progress on indicators such as content mastery, student attendance, and preparation for the next school level. Schools earn CCRPI points based on indicators that vary by grade and school level and align with measures of college- and career-readiness. Schools may earn up to a set number of points in five main categories, for a total of 100 possible points. In 2019-2020, statewide accountability was suspended due to COVID-19 closures.
