The Initial RCSS Reopening Plan

- Followed the June 1, 2020 guidance from the Georgia Department of Public Health and the Georgia Department of Education
- Utilized survey data from parents and employees
- Considered the number of COVID-19 cases in Augusta/Richmond County
- Included an action matrix for COVID-19 cases affecting schools
- Featured face-to-face and online options for students



Richmond County COVID-19 Numbers

- As of 14 July 2020 at 3:00 p.m. (24 June Numbers)
 - Confirmed Cases: 1830 (776)
 - Number of Richmond County Residents: 202,518
 - Cases per Week Moving Average: 250 (53)
 - Cases per 100k Richmond County Residents: 905 (383)
 - Deaths per 100k Richmond County Residents: 31 (24)
 - Total Deaths: 62 (48)

Administration Recommendation

• Hybrid

- 1. Traditional/Face-to-Face/Monday Friday
 - 1. Proposed Start Date: September 8, 2020
- 2. Virtual Learning/K-12 Online
- Parents must commit to an option by July 27, 2020
- Early August: Review plan and staffing based on student numbers registered for traditional or virtual learning
 - Staggered schedules may be implemented based on enrollment numbers per school
- If there is a surge in COVID-19 cases...
 - Before school starts: Recommend a further delay
 - Once school has started: Transition to full-time virtual learning for PK-12

Practicing Prevention

- Teach and reinforce good hygiene measures
- Provide hand soap, hand sanitizer, paper towels, and no-touch trash cans in all bathrooms, classrooms, and frequently trafficked areas
- Post signage on COVID-19 prevention & symptoms, good hygiene, and school/district specific protocols
- Clean/disinfect frequently touched surfaces daily
- Turn off water fountains and provide bottled water or allow students and staff to bring water from home
- Conduct deep cleaning before school reopens and on weekends, as needed



Transporting Students

- Provide hand sanitizer for students and bus drivers
- Provide masks/facial coverings to bus drivers
- Allow and encourage students to wear masks/facial coverings
- Utilize spaced seating where possible
- Eliminate field trips
- Clean and disinfect frequently touched surfaces on the bus daily
- Establish protocols for bus stops, loading/unloading students to minimize the congregation of children from different households



Entering School Buildings

- Post signage on COVID-19 prevention and symptoms, good hygiene, and school/system specific protocols
- Require parents to check their children's temperature before sending them to school
 - Require parents to keep sick children home if temperature over 100.4
- Require school system employees to check their temperature before coming to work
- Designate entrance and exit flow paths for each building
- Establish a protocol for visitors (e.g. requesting use of face coverings and restrict non-essential visitors/volunteers)
- Establish a protocol for student pick up/drop off



Serving Meals

- Allow and encourage student hand washing before and after meal service
- Provide hand sanitizers for students and staff
- Use disposable plates, utensils, and other similar items
- Designate entrance and exit flow paths for cafeterias and serving lines
- Conduct cleaning of cafeterias and high-touch surfaces throughout the day
- Other possible options (grade-level appropriate):
 - Serving meals in classrooms
 - Pre-packaged/boxed lunches

Transitioning

- Limit congregating between groups/grade levels
- Provide additional time for transitions
- Designate hallway flow paths to minimize/eliminate congregating
- Stagger class changes



Conducting Large Group Gatherings

- Abide by the maximum number of people allowed to congregate as defined by the Governor's current statewide Executive Order
- Discourage the congregation of students in parking lots and common areas
- Stagger the schedule, when possible, for large group gatherings, such as recess and school meals
- Identify and utilize large spaces for social distancing
- Follow GHSA guidelines for athletic events and practices



Supporting Teaching & Learning

- Use master schedule to balance class sizes
- Remove unused desks and furniture in classrooms to maximize social distancing
- Limit physical interaction through partner or group work
- Establish distance between teacher and student desks/workspaces
- Identify and utilize large spaces for social distancing

Protecting Vulnerable Populations

- Provide virtual learning opportunities for students and staff in vulnerable categories
- Consider allowing special education students, where possible, to continue in person instruction as these students often rely on daily routines and social interactions to address their individual learning needs
- Adhere to state and federal employment law and extended leave allowances, as well as FERPA and HIPPA requirements
- Consult with local board attorney and HR personnel to offer special accommodations for personnel who are members of vulnerable populations



When a Child, Staff Member, or Visitor Becomes Sick at School

- Utilize the district decision tree for COVID-19 Screening as recommended by the Georgia Department of Public Health and the Georgia Department of Education.
- Follow the Georgia DPH "Return to School Guidance after COVID-19 Illness or Exposure" criteria for students and employees before they return to the building.

Online Academy Key Terms

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- **Synchronous** teaching allows the teacher(s) and students to gather in real time using a virtual online meeting (Zoom or Teams) in order to engage, review, and discuss material and assignments.
- Asynchronous learning allows students to learn the same material at different times and locations. The term includes online learning in which students learn from instruction—such as prerecorded video lessons or game-based learning tasks that students complete on their own—that is not being delivered in person or in real time.

General Logistics

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- Students register for Online Academy July 1-20.
- Students commit to Online Academy for a semester at a time for High School students
 - Elementary School and Middle Sschool students can reconsider enrollment at fall break
- Online instruction offered Monday-Thursday
- Faculty housed at the National Hills Learning Center
- The Online Academy will be a "program" inside Infinite Campus; all student data will return to the zoned school





- K-5 students must have an adult in the home willing to assist the student during course hours, if needed. It is strongly recommended for 6-12.
- Paired (two staff members) home visits will be required, as necessary

High School Instructional Plan





- Students are scheduled to take 7 core courses and one homeroom/advisement course each semester
- Each course is scheduled for 50 minutes twice a week
- Teachers are required to offer a *minimum* of one synchronous lesson each week
- Teachers tutor/conference each afternoon and on Fridays; Teacher also have Professional Learning on Fridays
- HS teachers plan from 8:00-9:00 each day.



- Students will have one homeroom period scheduled each week to meet with a teacher, counselor, or administrator for advisement, as follows:
 - Individual synchronous advisement sessions
 - Small group synchronous advisement sessions
 - Individual asynchronous advisement activities
- Schedule allows students to travel to their zoned school to participate in after school extra-curricular activities, if they are available

Middle School Instructional Plan



- Students are scheduled to take 4 core classes each semester (ELA, Math, Science, and Social Studies – electives/connections will be optional and available through Edgenuity)
- Each course is scheduled for 50 minutes twice a week
- Teachers tutor/conference daily and on Fridays; Teachers will participate in Professional Learning each Friday
- MS teachers plan from 8:00-9:00 each day.
- Students can register for the AM OR the PM session



- Teachers are required to offer synchronous core class lessons daily Monday-Thursdays
- Schedule allows students to participate in after-school activities

- Teachers are required to conduct synchronous lessons *daily,* Monday-Thursdays
