What is the IB Learner Profile?

The IB learner profile represents a broad range of characteristics and responsibilities that encompass academic, personal, social and emotional growth. The ability to develop and demonstrate the attributes within the Learner Profile provides the foundation for developing "international mindedness" and teaches students the attributes needed for making positive changes. The IB describes the Learner Profile as the "heart of the program" with the focus on putting the student at the center of learning.

"The learner profile is the IB mission statement translated into a set of learning outcomes for the 21st century. The ten aspirational qualities of the learner profile inspire and motivate the work of teachers, students and



schools, providing a statement of the aims and values of the IB and a definition of what we mean by "internationalmindedness". The learner profile unites students, parents, teachers and administrators. The ten attributes aligned by the IB make for a wellrounded individual who is responsible for their own needs and learning and

empathetic to the needs of others.

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Learner Profile of the Month:



CANVAS – Creating an observer account Parents have the ability to view their student's course content as an observer in the course. To get started you must have the following:

1. To create an account and link to your student, your student must first log into Canvas

https://rcboe.instructure.co m on a computer (not a mobile device) with their Richmond County email and password.

2. Once logged in, the student will navigate to Account in the top left menu and click on settings. From settings, you will click on the Pair with an Observer button on the right side to generate a pairing code to share with the parent who is creating an observer account (or who will be adding the student or an existing observer account)

3. The student must be enrolled in courses before you can join as an observer



November - Focused on Caring

Each month we chose a different attribute to focus on for the month. November is all about Caring. Read below for information on how you can support your student at home.

Caring learners show empathy, compassion, and respect toward the needs and feelings of others. They have a personal commitment to service, and they act to make a positive difference to the lives of others and to the environment.

What can you do to help develop students their Caring skills at home?

- Be an example of the caring behavior you want to see in your child. Your child is always watching you and learning from you!
- Be a good listener to show that you care about people.
- Do small acts to show that you care, such as holding the door for someone or helping a stranger.
 - Get involved in your community.
 - Practice recycling and taking care of the Earth at home- Try to show your children that you care
 about the environment.
- After reading a book, spend some time considering how the people in the book acted. Was someone in the book caring? All of the time or just some of the time? Were all of the characters in the book caring or just some of them?
