

Youth can easily connect with their public library for the tools they need to build literacy skills, as well as fun resources to help develop a lifelong love of reading and learning.

### PLAY student library card benefits

- Check out books without late fees.
- Request items at any PINES library to be delivered for free to your local library.
- Use online reading and learning programs like eRead Kids, LearningExpress Library, and Mango Languages.

Students are automatically enrolled using their student ID/lunch number as a library account.

Families can choose to opt out of the program.

## PLAY supports students

# PLAY creates opportunities for students of all ages.

- Children can explore learning activities, literacy resources, and homework help.
- Teens can prepare for the future with tutoring, college exam prep, and job readiness skills.



### PLAY supports schools

PLAY strengthens relationships between libraries, schools, and communities.

- PLAY expands student access to resources and serves a complementary role in education.
- PLAY supports teachers with meeting standards and curriculum goals.
- The public library acts as an extension of the classroom and is available after school and during the summer months.



#### Get started with PLAY

- PLAY is a statewide initiative, but libraries and school systems forge local agreements for how to implement the program.
- PINES library systems sign a memorandum of understanding (MOU) with local school districts to participate in the program.
- With an MOU in place, the school shares limited directory information for each student with the library.
