Parts of Speech

NOUNS

PEOPLE, PLACES, THINGS, OR IDEAS.

EXAMPLES: ABRAHAM LINCOLN, WASHINGTON, D.C., FLAG, FREEDOM

VERBS

ACTIONS, EXPERIENCES, OR STATES OF BEING.

EXAMPLES: SWIM, DANCE, SMELL, REMAIN, BECOME, HAVE BEEN, HAS BEEN, IS, AM, ARE, WAS, WERE

PREPOSITIONS

CONNECT NOUNS/PRONOUNS
WITH OTHER
NOUNS/PRONOUNS, USUALLY
EXPRESSING A RELATIONSHIP
OF DISTANCE OR TIME.

EXAMPLES: BEYOND, ABOVE, BELOW, DURING, IN, OUT, ON, BETWEEN, THROUGH, TO

ADVERBS

TELL WHEN, WHERE, HOW, TO WHAT DEGREE; USUALLY MODIFIES A VERB, ADJECTIVE, OR ADVERB.

EXAMPLES: TOO, VERY, SOFTLY, ALWAYS, USUALLY, OFTEN

ADJECTIVES

DESCRIBE NOUNS, EITHER THEIR CHARACTERISTICS OR THEIR STATES OF BEING.

EXAMPLES: BRIGHT, MELLOW, BLUE, FRIENDLY, DISAGREEABLE, CRUEL

PRONOUNS

REPLACE NOUNS OR SHOWS WHICH NOUNS ARE BEING REFERRED TO. EXAMPLES: I, ME, MY, MYSELF, HE, SHE, IT, THEY, THOSE, THESE, THAT, THIS

CONJUNCTIONS

"CONNECTORS" OF WORDS, PHRASES, OR CLAUSES.

EXAMPLES: FANBOYS - FOR, AND, NOR, BUT, OR, YET, SO AAAWWUBIS - ALTHOUGH, AFTER, AS, WHILE, WHEN, UNTIL, BECAUSE, IF, SINCE

INTERJECTIONS

EXPRESS STRONG FEELINGS; "INTERRUPTERS" OF SENTENCES. EXAMPLES: AH, ALAS, EWW, WHEW, YIKES, AHEM, WHOAH, WOW, OUCH
