The mission of A. Brian Merry is to provide a rich, stimulating, successful educational partnership with students, their families and our community leaders.

Our Story:

In 1959, the Board of Education realized that the growth in the Greenbrier development had exceeded existing educational facilities in the area. Therefore, on October 8, 1959, the Board approved the purchase of 8.6 acres for A. Brian Merry. The original building, containing 17 classrooms, was opened in the fall of 1965 under the direction of Principal A. M. Carter. Five hundred students in grades 1-7 were enrolled. Eight new classrooms were added for the 1971-72 school year as 750 students crowded Merry's halls. During the 1972-73 school year 5th, 6th, and 7th graders were sent to other area schools. In 1973-74, the fifth grade was returned to Merry. The new wing of classrooms and physical education building was a dream come true. During the summer of 2016, the front office space was reconstructed. Plans are being developed to completely overhaul the heating and air conditioning system of the old wing.

### **Our CCRPI stats:**

College and Career Ready Performance Index (CCRPI) is Georgia's statewide accountability system. The CCRPI assesses how well students are prepared for college and careers and ensures that schools are focused on improving achievement among all students. The index measures progress on indicators such as content mastery, student attendance, and preparation for the next school level. Schools earn CCRPI points based on indicators that vary by grade and school level and align with measures of college- and careerreadiness. Schools may earn up to a set number of points in five main categories, for a total of 100 possible points. In 2019-2020, statewide accountability was suspended due to COVID-19 closures.
