C. T. Walker's mission is to foster the development of basic skills, character, courtesy, respect, patriotism, responsibility, and citizenship in an environment where standards and limits are firmly established, understood, and consistently enforced for teaching and learning to take place.

Named for Dr. Charles T. Walker, a prominent Augusta citizen and founding pastor of Tabernacle Baptist Church, C. T. Walker was built in 1934 as a school for grades one through seven housing approximately 1,500 students. In 1980, the school was established as a magnet school for Kindergarten through fifth grade. By 1983, the school had added grades six, seven and eight. The magnet school concept brought changes in structural organization, instructional strategies, teaching and learning philosophies, and expectations in both academic discipline. Students throughout Richmond County attend C. T. Walker, creating a dynamic and diverse student body. C. T. Walker is located in historic downtown Augusta, Georgia.

Our CCRPI stats:

College and Career Ready Performance Index (CCRPI) is Georgia's statewide accountability system. The CCRPI assesses how well students are prepared for college and careers and ensures that schools are focused on improving achievement among all students. The index measures progress on indicators such as content mastery, student attendance, and preparation for the next school level. Schools earn CCRPI points based on indicators that vary by grade and school level and align with measures of college- and career-readiness. Schools may earn up to a set number of points in five main categories, for a total of 100 possible points. In 2019-2020, statewide accountability was suspended due to COVID-19 closures.
