OUR CCRPI STATS:

College and Career Ready Performance Index (CCRPI) is Georgia's statewide accountability system. The **CCRPI** assesses how well students are prepared for college and careers and ensures that are focused on improving achievement among all students. The index measures progress on indicators such as content mastery, student attendance, and preparation for the next school level. Schools earn CCRPI points based on indicators that vary by grade and school level and align with measures of collegeand career-readiness. Schools may earn up to a set number of points in five main categories, for a total of 100 possible points. In 2019-2020, statewide accountability was suspended due to COVID-19 closures.
