- Schedule Independent Reading Time each day for 20 minutes.
- Communicate and send home important notices, updates, and student work in Wednesday folders each week.

## As a student, I will....

- Play the games and activities on the suggested websites.
- Review Math facts and sight words for at least 20 minutes daily (can be broken down for younger students)
- Read the books sent home each week, complete the reading tasks, and complete my reading log.
- Read at least 20 minutes every night.
- Ensure my parents receive all communication from the school by bringing home my Wednesday folder each week.

## As a parent, I will ...

- Visit the suggested websites and encourage my child to practice building vocabulary and math skills.
- Drill math facts at least 3 times a week.
- Encourage my child to read the books sent home each week, review and sign the reading log to show my child's progress.
- Encourage my child to read at home each day and talk with my child about the books they are reading.
- Review the Wednesday folder each week, discuss its contents with my child and respond to school communication when necessary.
