Student Achievement

- During the 25-26 school year, we will increase student content mastery in tested subject areas on the Georgia Milestones by 6%.
- During the 25-26 school year, we will increase post-high school readiness by increasing our graduation rate by 2%.

Hephzibah Elementary School

Hephzibah Middle School

- 1. During the 2025-2026 school year, we will increase stakeholder engagement by 20% through events and partnerships, measured by participation rates.
- 2. During the 2025-2026 school year, we will increase by 6% the number of students scoring proficient or above in Reading as measured by the 2026 Georgia Milestones.
- 3. During the 2025-2026 school year, we will increase by 6% the number of students scoring proficient or above in Math as measured by the 2026 Georgia Milestones.

Hephzibah High School

- During the 2025-2026 school year, we will decrease the percentage of students scoring at the Beginning Level by 10% across all EOC courses.
- 2. During the 2025-2026 school year, we will reduce chronic absenteeism from 49.7% to 39.7%
- 3. During the 2025-2026 school year, we will decrease the lowest quantile by 10% on the NWEA MAP Reading Achievement.
- 4. During the 2025-2026 school year, we will increase our graduation rate by 3 percentage points.





What is a Title I School?

Title I, Part A of the Every Student Succeeds Act of 2015 (ESSA) provides financial assistance to states and school districts. It's overall purpose it to ensure that all children have a fair, equal, and significant opportunity to obtain a high-quality education and reach, at a minimum, proficiency on challenging state academic achievement standards and assessments.

Title I Part A

 Title I funds are authorized and can be used to provide additional staff, professional development; instructional materials; improve curriculum; enhance parental involvement; extend learning time for students who need extra help; and provide other activities that are tied to raising student achievement on the State's academic achievement standards.

Requirements For a Title I Schoolwide Program

- •Title I, Part A is part of the Elementary and Secondary Act of 1965 as amended by the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA). This Act provides Title I, Part A funds through the Georgia Department of Education (GaDOE) to Local Educational Agencies (LEAs) and public schools to help ensure that all children meet challenging State academic content and student academic achievement standards.
- •Serves all students in the school, but requires special focus for lowest achieving
- Combines federal funds into total school budget
- •Is supplementary. The amount of Federal funds used in a schoolwide program must be supplemental to the amount of State and local funds the school would otherwise receive

The school parental involvement policy describes how the school will carry out the parental involvement requirements to ensure effective involvement of parents and to support a partnership among the school, parents, and the community to improve student academic achievement.



School - Parent Compacts

Each school that receives Title I funds must jointly develop and revise with parents a school-parent compact as part of the school-level parental involvement policy. The schoolparent compact is an agreement that outlines how parents, the entire school staff, and students will share the responsibility for improved student academic achievement and the means by which the school and parents will build and develop a partnership to help children achieve the state's high standards.



Parent Right to Know

Rights to request teacher qualification Notify if child has been taught by a non-highly qualified teacher for more than four weeks Letters are sent home to parents at beginning of school year



Collaborative Effort

Planning is a mechanism for building a constituency to support school change and should involve school staff, **parents**, and the community.



Parent Decision Making Opportunities

Parents have a right to:

- Request opportunities for regular meetings
- Formulate and share suggestions
- Be active participants in the educational decision making
- process (via Title One school-wide committee, school
- council meetings, PTA, etc.)
