




#### A UNIQUE BLEND OF TALENTS





#### THE HISTORY OF THE SENIOR CLASS OF 1987

Do you remember when the National Honor Society sponsored the Halloween picture show? Wasn't it fun to see the end of a movie before seeing its beginning? And remember when Ignacio transformed himself into a living robot on Era Day of our spirit week? He was definitely our 'tin man of the Niineties!'

Coming up to Christmas meant our journey to the Imperial Theater to see rehearsals of "The Nutcracker." What added to its appeal was the fact that some of our students were in it! Also, do you remember the very Christmasy Christmasy formal dance that was held in the school annex? (That annex was to become the site of many a future dance.) We gave a door prize to the best-dressed couple. (If you remember, Monica and Charles walked away with that one.) The dance was very successful — with the exception of one thing (Remember the disappearing microphone?).

Our freshman year was also the year of our first dance troupe called "The Davidson Dancers," and of our first mime troupe, which consisted of six individuals and their alternates.

The end of the year seemed to arrive quickly, and we closed things out with the traditional, last-day-of-school talent show. As you would expect, tears were shed, but these were quickly dried as thoughts of summer and the new fall term came to mind.

Our sophomore year began with 54 students, five of whom were new to the school. Twenty-three students had decided to go their separate ways, and their departure didn't go unnoticed. Nevertheless, that second year began much like the first. There was more excitement, though, because we were then sophomores, which was only two grades away from seniorhood — and graduation!

The only thing missing was a junior-senior prom. Well, seeing as we had no seniors at the time, the idea seemed ludicrous, so we improvised a bit: the high-school students decided to hop aboard the "Carribean Cruise," which by definition wasn't a prom, but was as enjoyable as one.

This, too, was a very successful academic year for Davidson. Many students were nominated for the Governor's Honors Program, and six actually got the chance to participate. One of the biggest and most profitable money-makers was the yard sale in front of the main building. Many other undertakings reaped succes and guided us toward our prom — and we couldn't have done it without the intelligent, vivacious and loving Ms. Deloach.

This was also the year of the Davidson Wind Ensemble, which began blowing successfully. With its new director, Mr. Drake, the band went to two competitions, scoring perfectly in the first. In the second competition, they took the highest award in a division they had not intended to enter, thus bringing home a trophy to add to our collection. This was only the beginning of the ensemble's success.

In this same year, the drama department performed impressively. They performed the one-act play "Tom Jones" in a local competition held at Augusta College and took home the first-place trophy. Their prize, too, was added to the growing collection of trophies already on display at DFA. And, as if that weren't enough, the actors and their play went to state competition, seizing second place on that level. Bravo!

The drama group also wowed audiences with the successful production "Spoon River Anthology," followed by Davidson's first musical, "The Boyfriend," which also went over exceedingly well.

Not only did arts excel within this year, but — as we've come to expect — so did the academics. The Star Student for Richmond County was John Stracke, a Davidson offspring who went on to compete on state level.

In the midst of all of our jubliee and success, tragedy reared its unwelcome head. Never must we forget the really important things in life, such as the precious life of another human being. And when that human is someone you know, and love, and enjoy, the thought of losing them takes on even more meaning and solemnity.

We shall never forget Tonya Granger. Her death came as a great shock to those of us who knew her, those of us who observed her friendly disposition, her bouncing walk, her sunny smile. We must always remember just how precious Tonya was — to her family at home, and to us, her school family.

On a national scale, there was the tragic explosion of the space shuttle, which took with it the lives of seven, adventurous humans. Yes, if we've experienced the joys of success this year, we've also tasted the bitterness of loss. And we've also come to appreciate the fact that life is precious — and fragile. Such a view makes us want to hold on to those dear to us, to let them know how much we care.

The year ended with the graduation ceremonies, which took place in the royal Imperial Theater. Happiness reigned, along with excitement, relief, and lingering sadness. The dignified occasion was marked by the beautiful singing of the chorus, the wonderful playing of the band, and the quiet flowing of tears. The graduating of the first class was a reassuring pattern of what was to come.

Our senior year began with the same level of excitement that has existed at the closing of the junior year. The excitement seems to have remained behind at the school at the closing of last term, slumbering in the deserted halls throughout the summer vacation, only to be awakened by the raw energy and keen anticipation of the returning seniors. Then, in the fall together as a class, we began the only chore seniors enjoy doing — choosing caps and gowns, invitations and name card, autograph and memory books and rings, those noble symbols of alumnity. Also, we discussed the senior trip, in an attempt to decide where the most fun and freedom from our patents, and the most adventure would be.

Also, every senior purchased a personalized sweatshirt that had the names of the entire graduating class emblazoned on the front. The shirts were designed by James Thompson, (J.T. as most of us know him) himself a senior; orders were handled by our business manager, Maxine Coleman. She also designated a day for the senior to wear the sweatshirts, to show off our true class spirit.

Thanks to Mr. H. and his motley crew, who worked so hard to raise money for our privileges. His "crew" included Monica Birt; Prez; Trecia Wilhite; Vice-Prez; Viva Henry; Treasurer; Paula Godley; Secretary; and Maxine Colman; Business Manager. Also, members of the senior council, which was comprised of representatives from both senior homerooms.

The year was not without its academic strain, even amidst all the jubliee of imminent departure. There were crucial exams that had to be passed since we had already come THIS far. The solemnity of choosing college and of preparing mentally and emotionally for such a life was an ingredient impossible to ignore icing on the cake in this regard — or salt in the stew — was the dreaded SAT exam, which some of us have discovered to be less menacing than we'd been told.

All of the head-pounding we've done at the hands of John S. Davidson will, in the future, reap results worth striving for . . . at least, we hope so. (Because — face it — some of us couldn't learn from Ann Mansfield Sullivan if she rose from the dead to teach us.)

As we are a school that specializes in the fine arts, it is quite appropriate to note the outstanding achievement of our musicians, actors, and dancers.

The Wind-Ensemble, ever-growing and now at the point of sterling quality of sound, received perhaps the highest honor bestowed upon any area high-school musical group this year: they were invited to perform at a dedication ceremony at Pendleton King Park, as invited guests of the Mayor, Charles DeVaney himself!!

Adding to that honor was the fact that they performed "Fastivo," a musical composition, before Vasclav Nelhybel, the man who composed the piece!! With warmth and eagerness, Nelhybel offered instruction and helpful hints to the band of talented musicians. What an honor — a double honor — perform for a master and Mayor!!






### What do you remember most ... about DFA?






Physical Education
