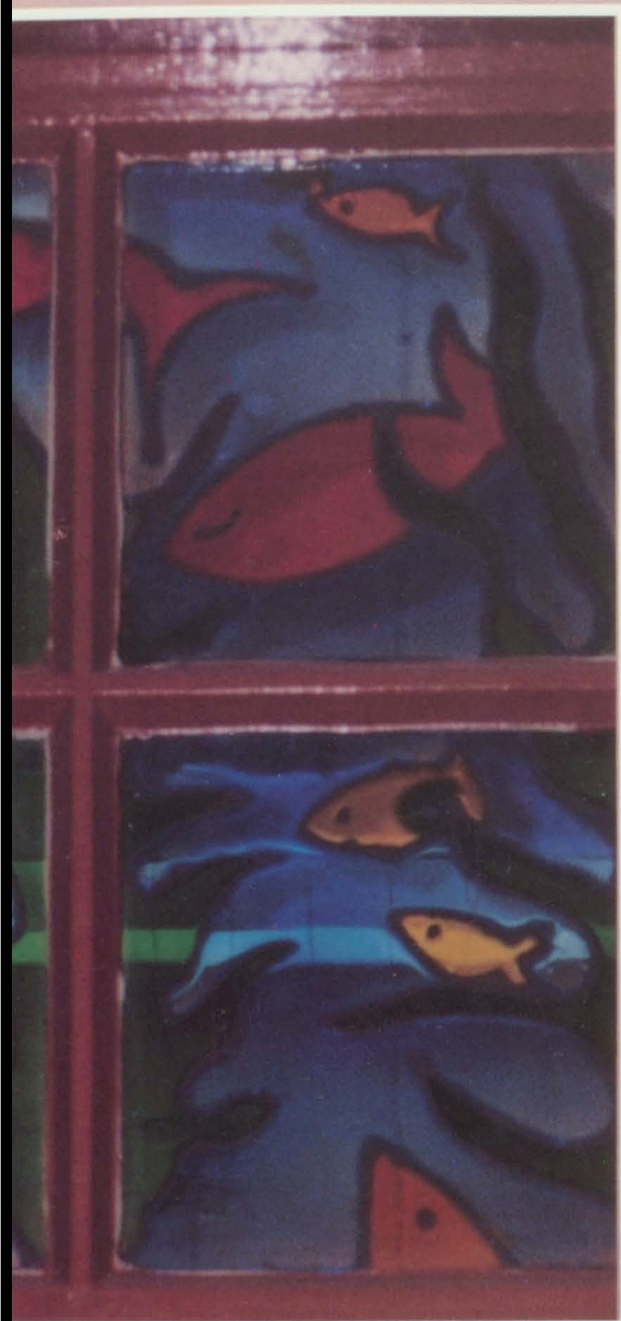

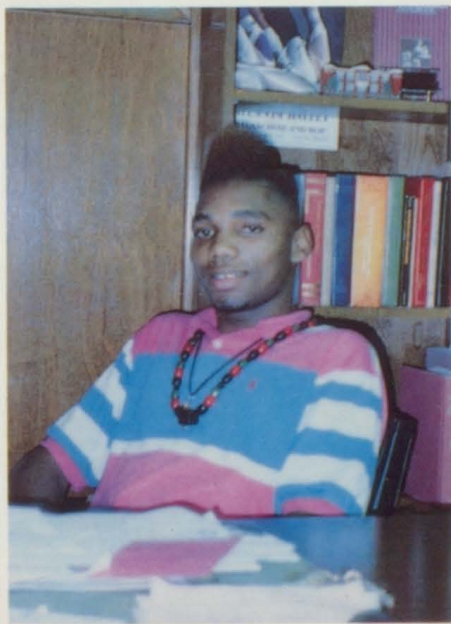
Color Him Terrific!!

All in all, the 1990 prom (for whatever reason) will be remembered by everyone.



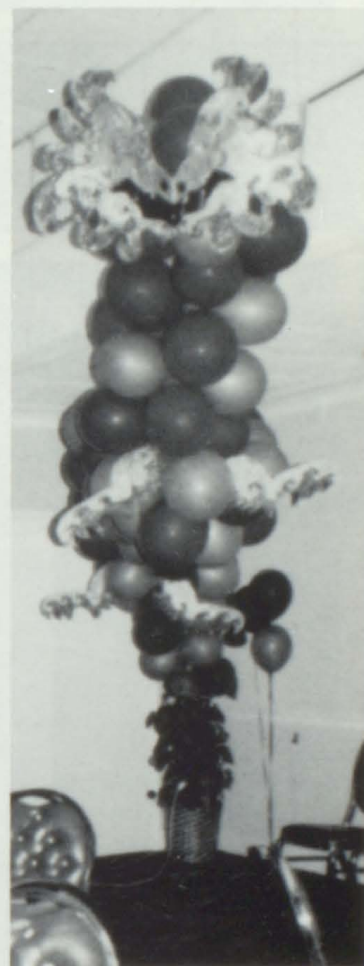

The heavy rains the night of October 12 surprised us all. No one expected the city to be as handicapped by the flood as it was, although many students were pleasantly surprised to find that school was canceled.



Considering all the controversy concerning the First Amendment around the country, we thought that it was necessary to find out how Davidson students and faculty felt. Controversy like this has always existed, but since we now have faster, more efficient means of communication, more people are taking notice. More people are becoming aware of what is going on in the world." —Jo Agostas

"It is the people who go beyond the accepted limits who set the standards for the future. There was controversy about Galileo's theories. In fact, it seems that what is considered controversial today would have been heretical long ago. It is all a matter of perspective." —Heather Halpin

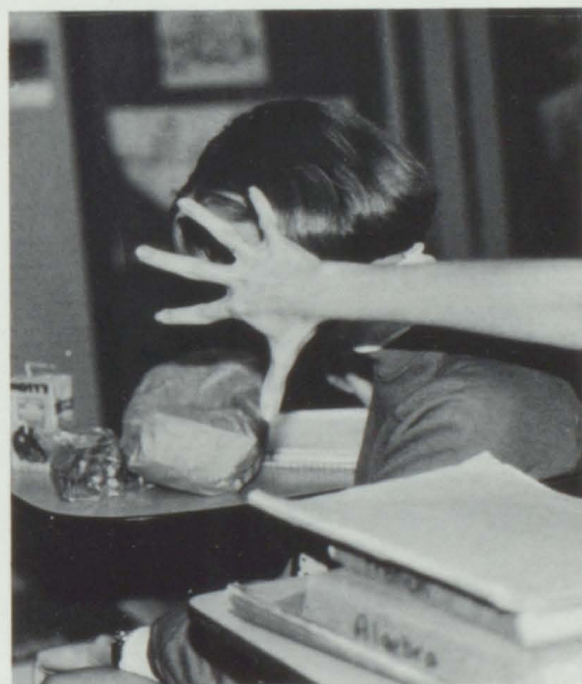
Not all of us realize the severity of what is going on in the Middle East. Some believe that we are not the world's policeman, or what the U.S. Armed Forces are defending is not worth the lives that might be sacrificed in armed combat. Still others feel that we have a right to be there to protect our principles and Kuwait from the dangerous encroachments of Saddam Hussein. Is the Bush administration doing the right thing, or are we setting ourselves up for something too big for us to handle?

Besides monetary commitment, the U.S. has a right to protect its allies in situations of injustice—as in that of unprovoked invasion." —Bruce Powell

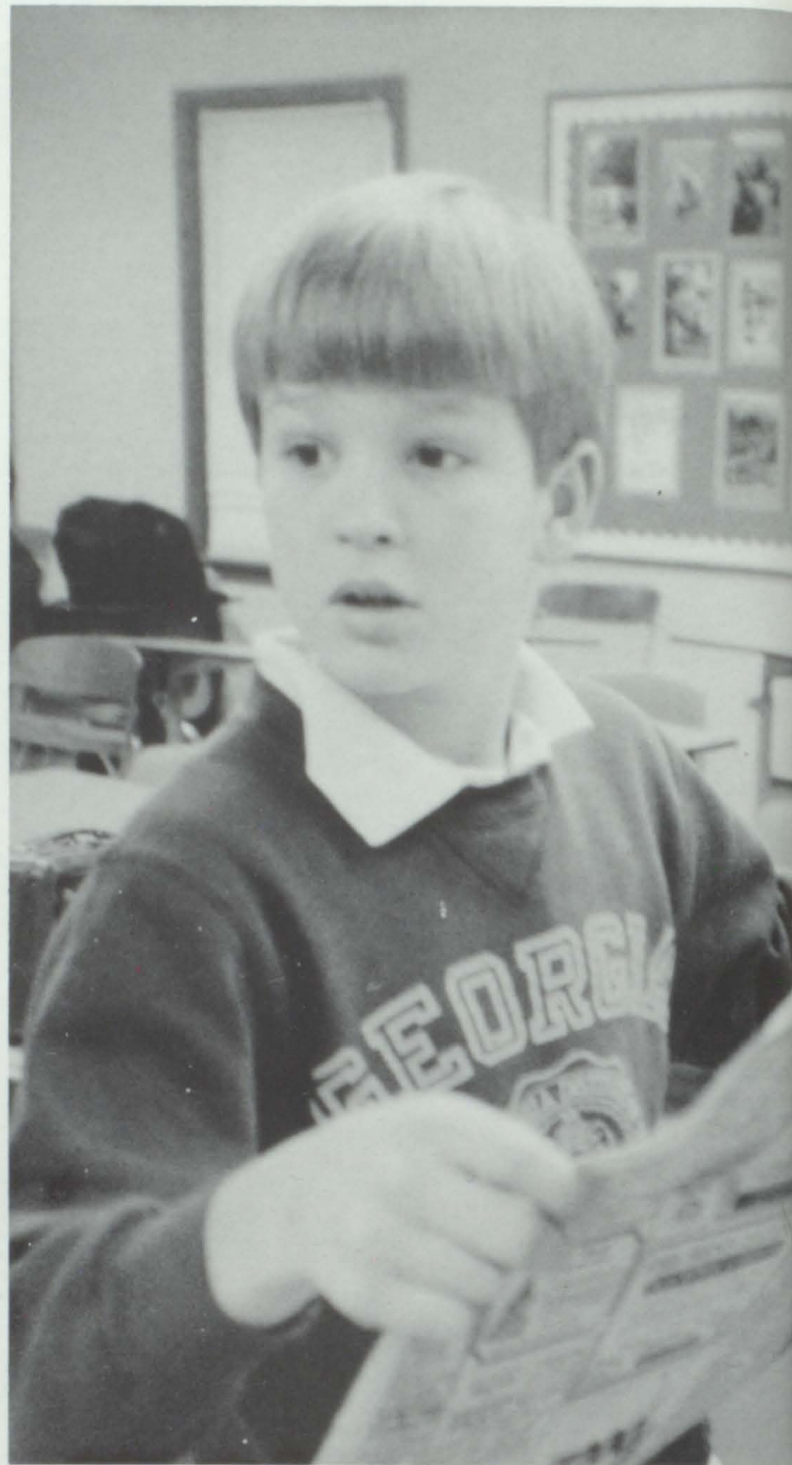

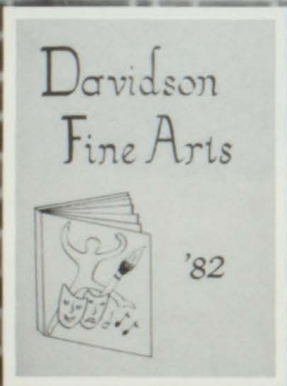

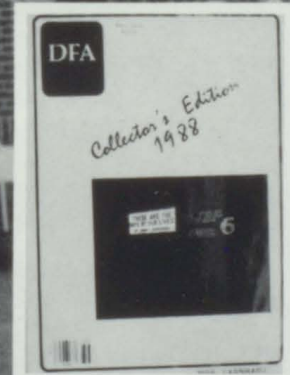
Well, it is Davidson's tenth Anniversary, but instead of making a wish list, we might be interested to find out

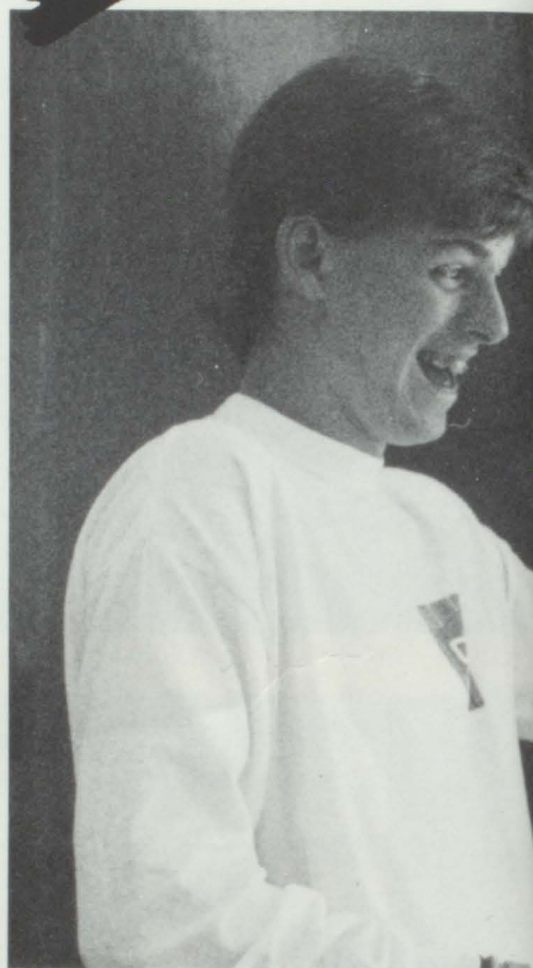

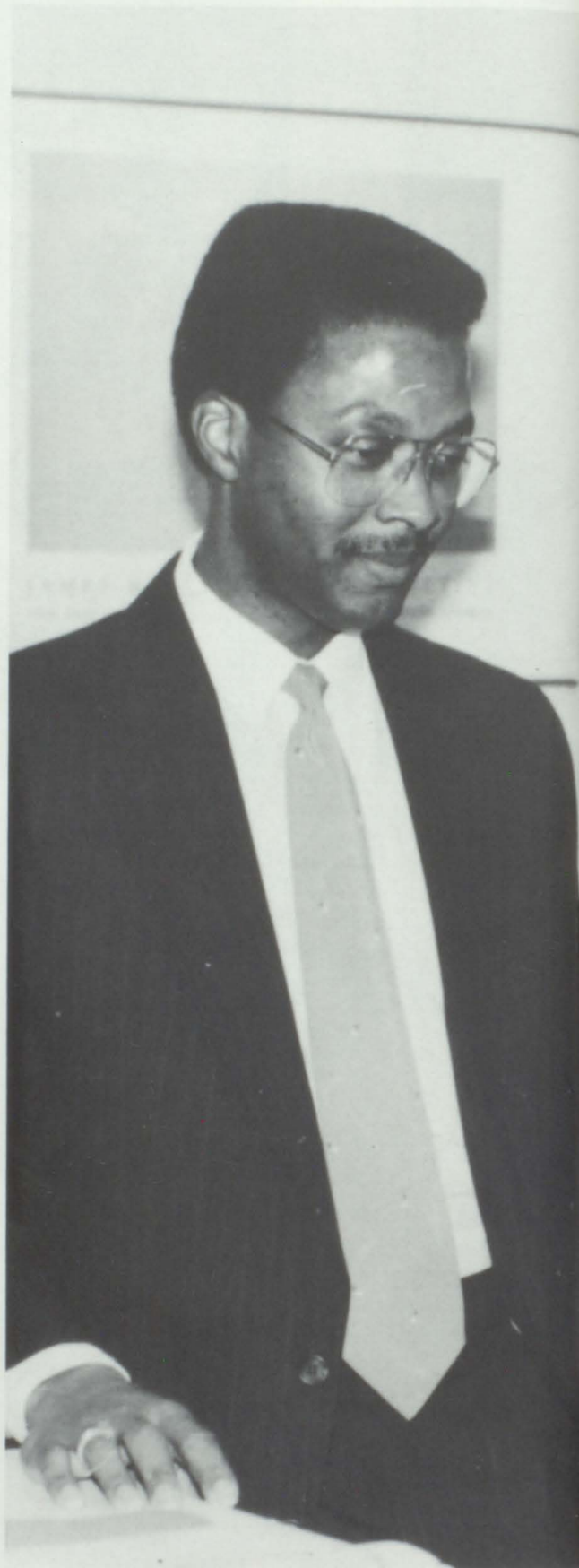
Mr. Welcher can be found during the day in the lunch room conversing with students and making sure everyone is

From the First Stroke To a Masterpiece

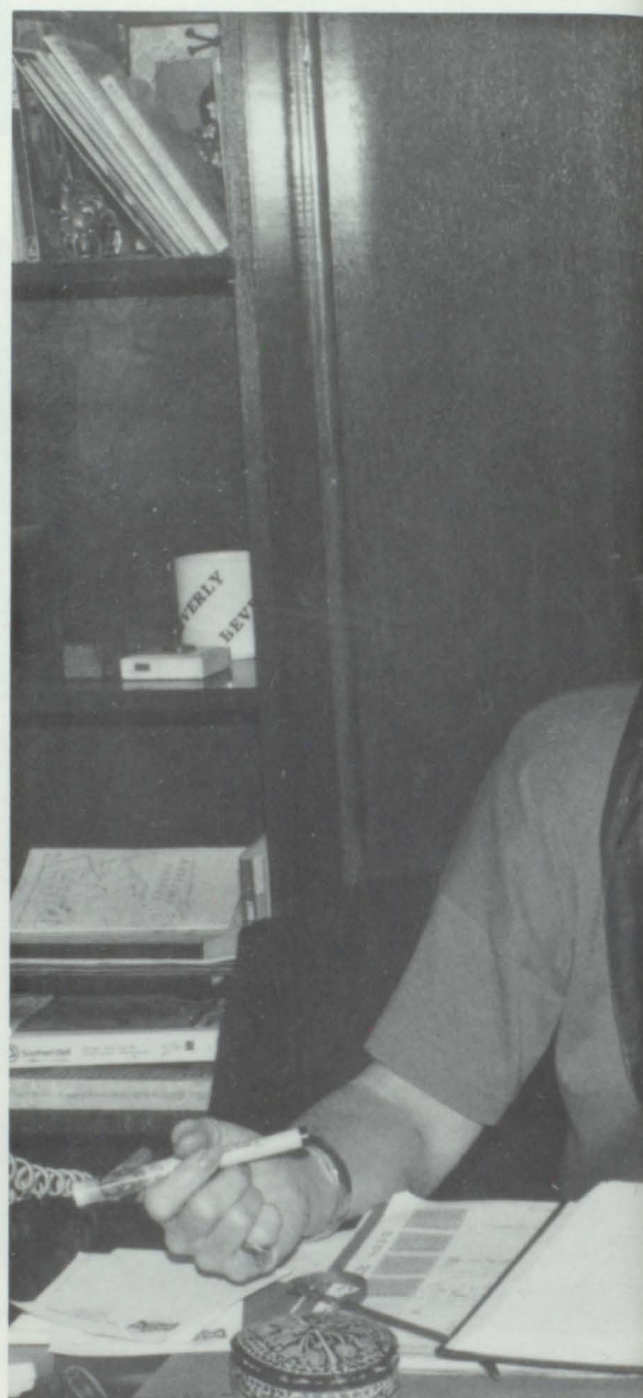

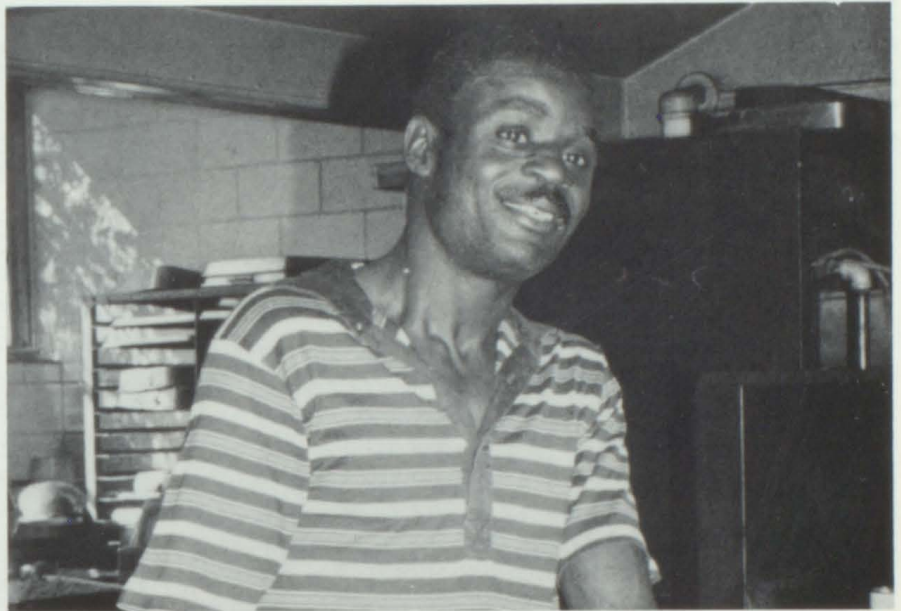

Below, Mr. Hill takes a break to tell a joke in the lunchroom.

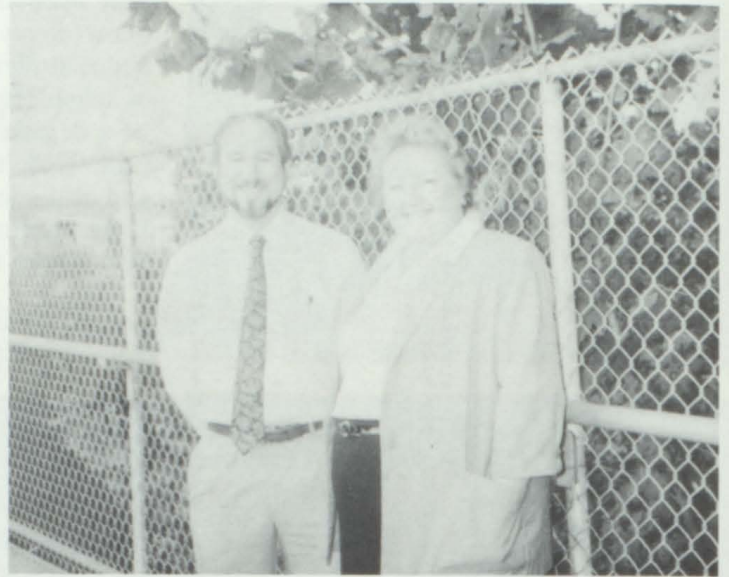

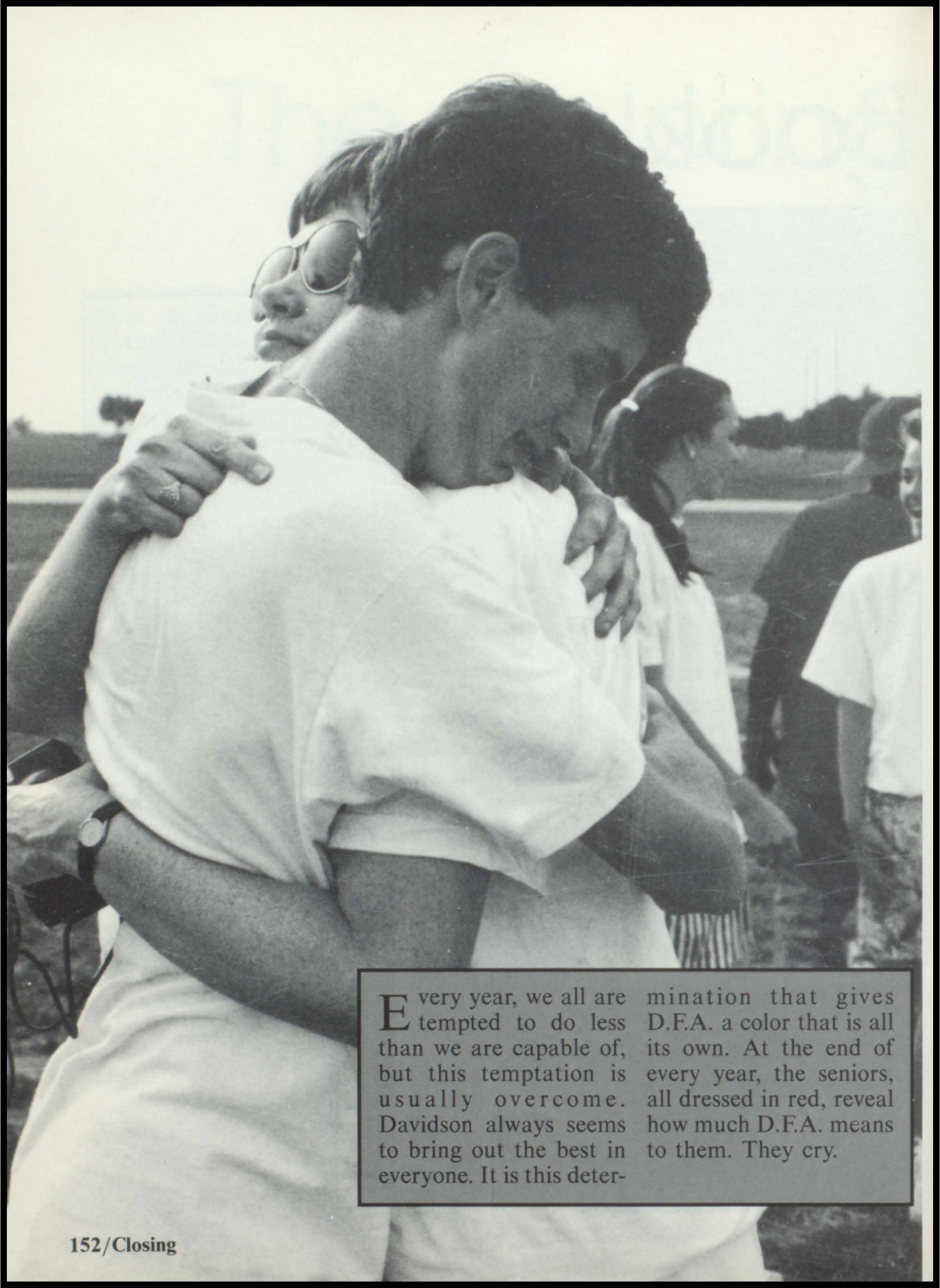


Some students and teachers experienced Japan up close and personal when a delegation of dance, drama, music, art, and Japanese students took a trip during Masters vacation.
