

Bullying

Bullying is an attempt or threat to inflict injury on another person or create fear in that person. Bullying is intentional, often repeated, and is harmful. It can be verbal or physical, and occur in person, online, or via other means of communication.

Victims of bullying often feel insecure, have lower self-esteem, and may show signs of depression. These students may have poor school attendance, lower grades, and/or behavior issues. Additionally, victims of bullying are at an increased risk of dropping out of school. As reported by the Richmond County School System, research shows that a student who is identified as a bully by age eight is six times more likely to have a criminal conviction by age 24.
