

#### **President Franklin Roosevelt**

Franklin Delano Roosevelt (later called FDR) was born on January 20, 1882 in New York State. He was born into a wealthy family and attended an elite private school, Groton School in Massachusetts. He traveled to school from New York in his parent's private railway car. He then graduated from Harvard College. He later dropped out of Columbia Law School but practiced law after he passed the law exam, called a bar exam. He married Anna Eleanor Roosevelt on March 17, 1905 and they had four sons and a daughter.



In 1921 FDR contracted polio, which paralyzed both of his legs. FDR could walk with difficulty using canes and braces and spent most of his time in a wheelchair. Yet in 1928 FDR ran for governor of New York, serving two terms.

FDR became the presidential nominee of the Democratic Party in 1932 and won by a landslide. He was elected president during the Great Depression and took measures to start putting people back to work with federal government programs such as the Works Progress Administration (WPA) and the Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC). Projects done on buildings and parks by these groups are still in use today. FDR also created the Tennessee Valley Authority (TVA) to bring electricity to Tennessee and neighboring states. FDR introduced a pension program for workers called Social Security which Americans still rely upon after retirement. All of these programs together were called the New Deal.

In 1939 World War II broke out in Europe and in 1940 FDR was re-elected as president for a third term. On December 7, 1941 Japanese planes attacked the American military base at Pearl Harbor in Hawaii, drawing the United States officially into the war. During World War II the United States was fighting Japan in the Pacific Ocean and Germany and Italy in Europe and North Africa. There were numerous occasions when world leaders Joseph Stalin of Russia and Winston Churchill of Great Britain met with FDR to discuss strategy for winning the war.

In 1944, FDR was re-elected to his fourth term but he was not in good health. FDR died on April 12, 1945, three months into his fourth term, leaving Vice President Harry Truman to take over the presidency. In 1952 Congress added the 22<sup>nd</sup> Amendment to the U.S. Constitution to limit future presidents to two terms in office.


