The True History of St. Patrick's Day: Saints, Shamrocks, and Leprechauns

Have you ever wondered how the St. Patrick's day celebrations began? Believe it or not it did not start off with Leprechauns! The March 17 celebration started in 1631 when the Irish church established a Feast Day honoring St. Patrick.

St. Patrick had been the Patron Saint of Ireland who had died around the fifth century—a whopping 12 centuries before the modern version of the holiday was first observed.

Very little is known about who he actually was. According to Marion Casey, a clinical assistant professor of Irish Studies at New York University, "We know that he was a Roman citizen, because Britain was Roman then, and then he was enslaved and taken to Ireland, where he either escaped or was released," Casey says. "And then he became a priest and went back to Ireland, where he had a lot of luck converting the Druid culture into Christians."

Legend says St. Patrick was actually born Maewyn Succat, but that he changed his name to Patricius (or Patrick), which comes from the Latin term "father figure," after he became a priest. That supposed luck he had is the root of all the modern celebrations on St. Patrick's Day.

It wasn't until the early 18th century that many of today's traditions were kicked into high gear.

Around the 1720s, the church found it "got kind of out of control," Casey says. People were out dancing and celebrating much to the church's disappointment. To remind celebrants of what the holiday actually stood for, the church assigned St. Patrick a symbol which was the lucky shamrock.

The shamrock was chosen because According to legend, St. Patrick used the shamrock when converting the Irish to Christianity. The three leaves of the plant were used to explain the Holy Trinity: the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit.

Modern-day celebrations and themes continued to take shape during the rest of the 1700s. In 1762, the first New York City parade took place. It wasn't until 1798, the year of the Irish Rebellion, that the color green became officially associated with the day. Up until the rebellion, the color associated with St. Patrick was actually blue, as it was featured both in the royal court and on ancient Irish flags.

Since during the rebellion the British wore red, the Irish chose to wear green and started singing the song "The Wearing of the Green" during the rebellion. This created the importance associated with the color green in Irish history.

As for the leprechaun, that's an even later addition. Eventually, St. Patrick's day came to represent all things Irish. The Leprechaun has been part of Irish folklore and legend for centuries but because of its association with luck it was a perfect fit with the St. Patrick theme.

Today, St. Patrick's day would not be St. Patrick's day without the Leprechaun regardless of the fact that it really does not have much to do with St. Patrick himself. The mischievous magical shoe making elf that hordes all his gold in pots is actually more well-known than St. Patrick himself! Giving students choice in playing academic games is important because students feel like they are part of the process and this makes the activity more interesting to

them. Part of the reason we love to play is because we choose to do so and this makes us more invested in that play.

Programs like games4ed are looking into how to use games in the classroom in the most engaging way for students. This website offers many educational games for students to choose from and for teachers to use for student learning. Offering choices, allows students to be more in control of their own learning and ensures that the experience is more interesting for students.

Another good way to get students excited about game playing is to have students create some of the games themselves. Students can make games on fun and easy game making websites like Kahoot, Jeopardy, Amino, and Quizizz just to name a few. When students are allowed to make the games they will learn from, the learning experience is made more fun and challenging for students.

Playing cool games, to include student created games, can be a powerful way to learn. It's actually instinctual to learn through play. So the next time you are trying to learn or teach, consider using games, but do not forget to make the games fun by allowing for choice and creativity.

Dear Abby,

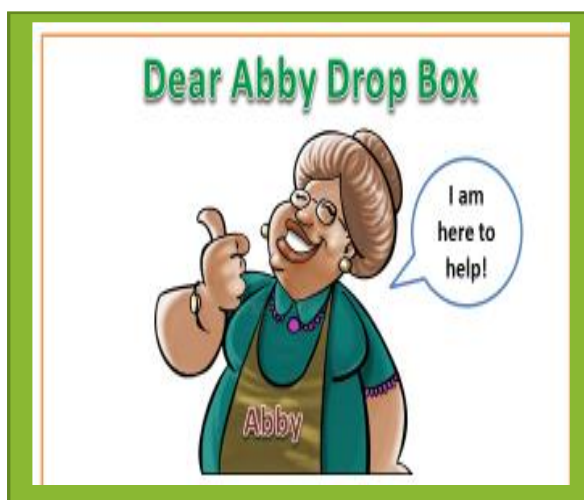
I am sad all the time. Even when I have no reason to be sad. I try to be happy but I just can't. I try to look happy so everyone

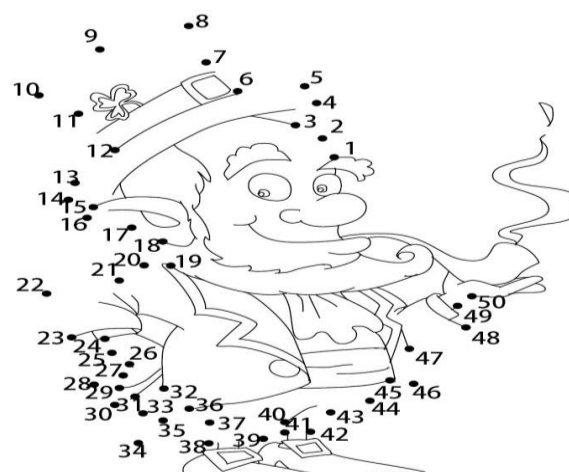

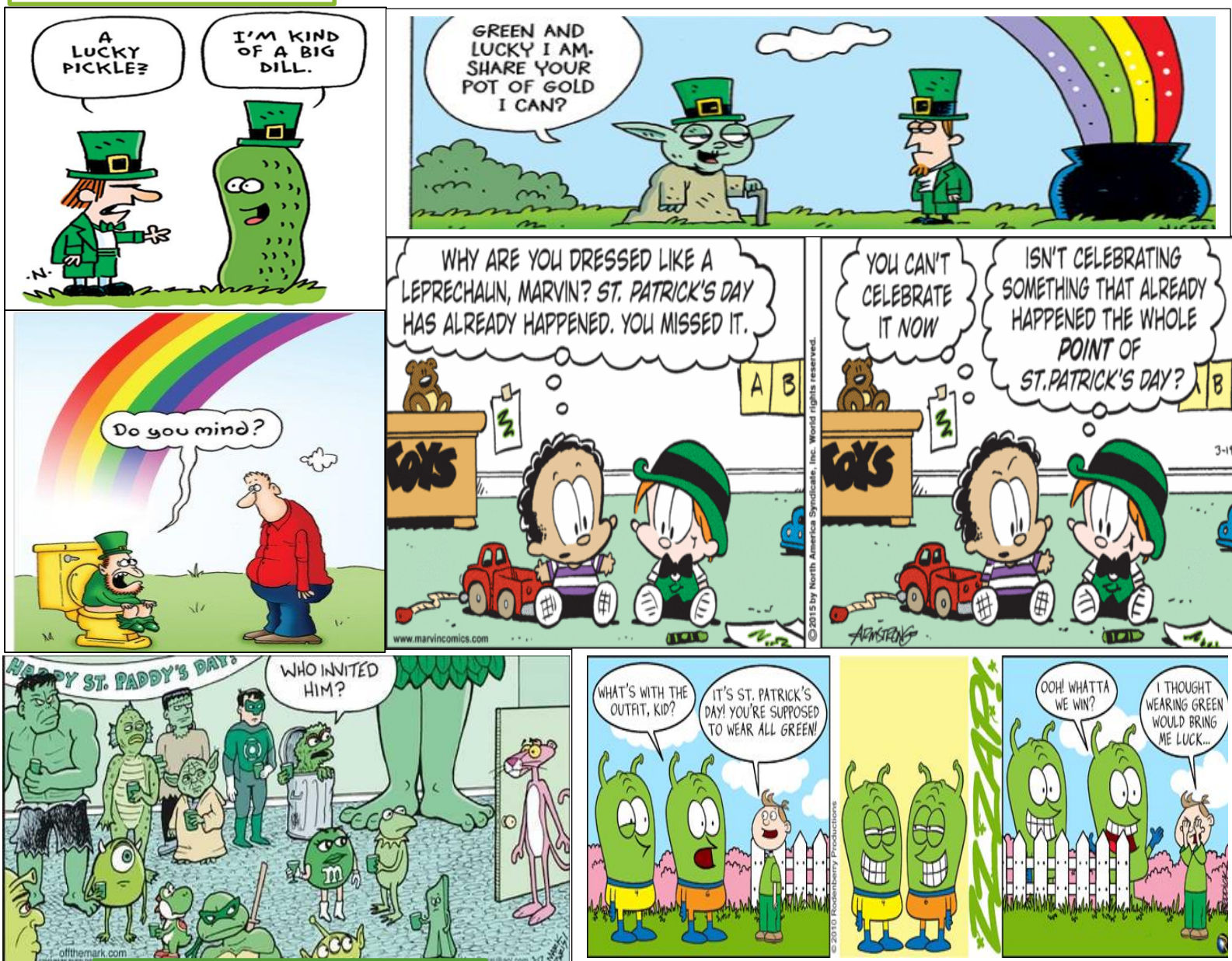
