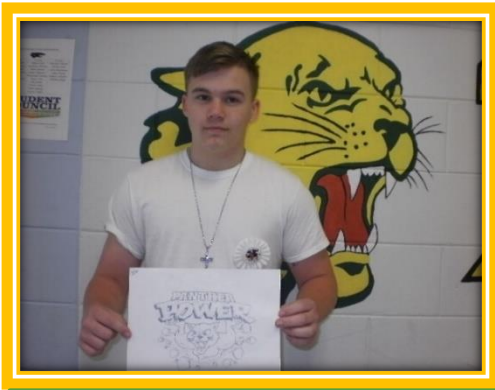


Isaiah Maiden 2<sup>nd</sup> place art Winner and his creation featured to the right
