

A Call for Unity as the Nation and Pine Hill Supports Marjory Stoneman Students Through Their Terrible Loss and Advocacy for Change

The fire alarm goes off. What they thought was a regular fire drill, for many, turned out to be the most dangerous and tragic situation they had ever encountered. When students exited Marjory Stoneman Douglas High that day, lining up in regular fashion, they were fired upon with rapid gunfire from an AR15 automatic rifle.

Everyone did the best they could to hide, run, and protect each other, but still, seventeen lives were lost that day. As a country, this is a madness that we cannot understand but one thing is absolutely for certain: This should never happen again.

Six days later, that's exactly what students Jaclyn Corin and Cameron Kaskey along with over hundred students and five chaperones aimed to do when they loaded charter busses to travel to the state capitol in Tallahassee to advocate for stricter gun control laws.

This movement has been coined the #NEVERAGAIN movement. Students and teachers are organizing initiatives to raise the legal age to buy guns from 18 to 21 and for "common sense" laws to be enacted concerning being able to obtain the weapons. The tension and emotions that have fueled these meetings is highly due to students feeling as if lawmaker's neglect toward these issues has allowed for this type of tragedy to happen again and again.

As a student and a person, I feel that laws are not the only thing that can regulate people. People can regulate other people. We can't always control what law makers do but we can regulate ourselves by becoming more united and being more sensitive to others.

We regulate each other by helping another in need or telling other people what's right and wrong. In my opinion, laws are like signs or basically warnings to the world on how to behave and to survive in our society and people are more of like the physical force that can do more than just suggest or tell you not to do something.


People can actually impact each other to do the right thing not because a law tells you not to do it but for the sake of it being the right thing to do.



From Activist to Author: Thirteen-Year-Old Girl Rights a Wrong Centuries Old

Thirteen- year-old social activist Marley Davis, founder of the 1000BlackGirlBooks campaign is currently trending on social media. Marley started her campaign and wrote her book because she felt like black girls needed a voice, and she was tired of feeling like she and other black girls were invisible in literature.

Her journey started when Marley's mother asked her, "If you could change one thing about the world what would it be?" Marley's response was that she would like to live in a world "where black girls were free to be complicated, honest, and where their voices and stories mattered."

Black people are more than just the negative stereotypes seen in the media and literature. Black people are kind, loving, energetic, and funny just like every group in the world and deserve to have their own stories. Unfortunately, because of the color of their skin, Black people are more often misjudged, labeled, and limited in their roles in books. Marley hoped to change the way black girls look at themselves as well as the way others see them.

Windows and Mirrors is a metaphor Marley uses for others to understand, read, and learn about the culture of Black girls. She wants to create "windows" or

ways for other people to look into the hearts and minds of black girls and "mirrors" or reflections of black girls' experiences in stories so that they can see themselves in the books they read.

Not only is Marley's campaign trending, it has also opened up the eyes of many people, and made them realize the importance of recognizing Black girls in books. Marley's original challenge was to find one thousand books with Black girls as the main characters. Marley now has over 10,000 books with black girls as the main characters. She plans to donate these books to libraries all around the world so













that black girls' stories can actually matter. Marley's campaign has allowed black girls to read these books and identify themselves, see themselves, and learn about their history.

Marley Dias a thirteen-year-old, is part of the one percent of people that actually do something about problems. As Marley put it, "If you have a dream put your mind to it and you can succeed." If I was to meet Marley I would give Marley a big hug because of how she gave black girls a voice, helped them to identify with their culture, and allowed them to realize their worth on this planet we call Earth.

Therefore, Marley's campaign was not only beneficial to black girls it benefited other people too by allowing them to see a different perspective of black girls. Kids are not just small immature humans. Kids can be part of that one percent of people that do something about things.

Kids can speak up and speak out and give other kids that are outspoken a voice and encouragement to pursue their dreams. Kids can even show adults and other peers that the sky is the limit when you give your all to make a much needed change.

This problem has been around forever but it took one brave little girl to say enough is enough. Just being able to see how African Americans use to communicate through dance was very interesting. The women and men danced back and forth, clapping and stomping their feet. It was amazing to watch.


