Course Description:

Spanish is a modern languages course designed for students who are taking their first two years of high school foreign language credit. This course teaches basic language patterns and vocabulary, focusing on all four language skills listening, speaking, reading and writing. Culture is also an integral part of the course and is introduced through the use of media, adapted readings and class discussions. In addition to written tests and quizzes, students may also be assessed by means of listening and speaking activities or performance based assessments. Homework assignments are an integral part of this course; they reinforce and build new connections between concepts/skills explored in class, which enable students to participate in class in a more meaningful way. Active participation is expected to excel in this course.

- 4. Develop Insight into the Nature of Language and Culture

Instructor's Values:

- 1. Honesty. Honesty to yourself. Honesty to me.

- 6. Attitude and dedication cause success as much as natural ability and intellect. When you approach a text, class, or whatever with negative expectations, you will make the experience negative. Be open. Be aware of your attitude.

Academic Honesty: Students will do their own work. Any student caught or suspected of cheating/plagiarizing will receive consequences. Academic dishonesty includes cheating, fabricating or falsifying information or sources, improper collaboration, submitting the same paper for different classes without permission, and plagiarism. Plagiarism occurs when writers deliberately or unintentionally use another person's language, ideas, or materials and present them as their own without properly acknowledging and citing the source. Google Translate is a form of plagiarism. DO NOT USE IT! *Cheating, plagiarism, the use of translators, or any form of academic dishonesty in this course results in one or more of the following consequences: failure of the assignment, parent contact, and repeated offenders will result in a disciplinary referral.* Cite sources carefully, completely, and meticulously; when in doubt, cite. You are always welcome to come to tutoring for editing or have a classmate peer-review your work when you are not taking a test. Challenge yourself and do it on your own!

Computer/Technology/Printer access: It is imperative that you have access to a computer and working printer at all times. To prevent technology access being restrictive, assignments whenever possible will be formatted to be cell phone friendly. As needed, physical packets of the materials will be made available. Should Canvas be down, students will have the option of submitting assignments via Microsoft Teams or email. Students should tell the teacher whenever this option is utilized otherwise it will not be considered submitted.

Attendance & Tardy Policy: Your daily, timely attendance is required. Class will begin promptly and will last up to the dismissal bell. You will be considered absent/cutting class if you are 10 or more minutes late. The instructor considers it rude when you begin packing up before class is over.

Absences: The course follows the official district policy: for every day the student has an *excused* absent, he/she has up to five days to make up his/her excused work. Make up assignments/assessments are accessible in designated areas of the classroom as well as online.

Late/ Missing Work Policy: Assignments are due at the beginning of class. If an assignment is turned in after being collected, it is officially a day late. Late work or unexcused absences will be accepted using the following policy:

1 day late = 10 points reduction in grade

2 days late = 20 points reduction in grade

3 days late = 30 points reduction in grade

4 days late =40 point reduction in grade

5 days late = 50 point reduction in grade

No assignment will be collected after 5 days late.

Please Note:

- 1. The teacher has the choice of following the above policy or accepting late work from all students without penalty.
- 2. *To maintain academic integrity, the teacher may refuse late work that students attempt to turn in after the original assignment has been graded and returned to the class.
- 3. Submit your missing/late work in the "Late" basket. At the top of the assignment, please write how many days late it is and why it is late. Work without the number of days and the reason will not be accepted. Your honesty is appreciated. Example: Late 1 day because I was too tired after drama rehearsal and had to study for a calculus quiz.
- 4. While due dates will be employed, they can be extended under extenuating circumstances. For students to receive a deadline extension without penalty, they must communicate with the teacher via one of the approved, normal means of communication BEFORE the due date passes. Examples of means of communication include but are not limited to: email, Remind, and Canvas message. If due dates need to be extended repeatedly, students can expect a parent conference will be scheduled.

Canvas Plan:

- Have resources/modules available and ready.
- Each Module will consist of the following:
 - Prerecorded instruction lessons with interactive questions. Videos are not to exceed 20 minutes
 - o A chat/discussion assignment that engages with the topics
 - o Submission of a spoken activity, preferably using FlipGrid to create the file
 - A written activity scaffolded to the skill of the student with preference given to uploaded pictures of hand-written work

- A reading activity with question responses
- Assigned workbook/textbook pages. Again, preference will be to upload images of handwritten work in the workbook or on notebook paper (to go into binder)
- Submission of lecture notes (again preference for hand-written work). These will vary from guided notes provided by the teacher or self-created notes from information given in the lecture.
- o One-two major assignments/projects/PBA per module

Major Assignments/Projects/PBAs:

- Content/grammar quizzes will be in Canvas, Quizlet, or Quia with time restrictions
- Handwritten Grammar and Content Review sheets are to be submitted before a major performance task is administered
- A performance-based assessment will be given per module. This will vary depending on the content and will be graded with a specific rubric. There will be a speaking component to be recorded and posted on FlipGrid
- Students can correct and/or resubmit their assignment by the given deadline to improve their grade by 50% if they correct the errors with limited teacher feedback.

Differentiation Plan:

- Face to Face: Students will operate in a flipped classroom format with more hands on time from the teacher. They will also have a significant amount of class time provided to complete the assignments posted in Canvas.
- Online: Students will operate semi-independently with frequent electronic check-ins. The weekly synchronous hour will be formatted as a brief review of module topics, emotional well-being check-ins, and Q&A. Occasionally, it will also provide time for synchronous student presentations.

Grade Recovery:

In an effort to help students who are behind academically, there will be different ways for credit/grade recovery. At the discretion of the teacher, this may include but is not limited to:

- Retake of a quiz/test (averaged out with the original score for a final score in the gradebook)
- Duolingo
- Chapter review pages of notes

Extra Credit Policy

I do not give extra credit assignments to individual students. Frequently, all students will have the opportunity to earn extra points during class activities. Occasionally, a bonus question or more may appear on some exams or quizzes. Be attentive to find out more details when extra credit opportunities are given.
