About Charles Oatman and the 1970 Augusta Riot

On May 11, 1970 Augusta became the site of Georgia's largest urban rebellion during the Civil Rights era. It stemmed from the brutal beating death of a young, 16year-old boy named Charles Oatman. A native of Wilkes County, Charles was adopted at a young age by Cornelia and Grover Oatman of Augusta. He was raised at True Vine Baptist Church and attended A.R. Johnson Junior High School. He was a small, gentle boy, well-liked by his classmates and teachers, many of whom called him Charlie. He was also developmentally disabled. The news of his brutal beating death while in state custody profoundly shook Black citizens of Augusta. They mobilized to demand justice, but white officials met their demands with threatened violence and attempts at a cover-up. Indignant and assertive, thousands of Black citizens launched the largest urban rebellion in the Civil Rights era South, commonly known as the "Riot of May 11-12, 1970."

In remembrance of Charles Oatman, the Lucy Craft Laney Museum of Black History, in conjunction with the 1970 Augusta Riot Observance Committee. is offering the Charles Oatman Memorial Award.

About the Charles Oatman Memorial Award

Each year, two high school seniors, will receive \$1,000 to aid in their aspirations of building a better Augusta, a better South, and a better world. Applicants must be members of the Laney Walker-Bethlehem community (students at AR Johnson, TW Josey, and Lucy Craft Laney High Schools) and have a strong vision for Augusta's future in regards to our mission of awareness, recovery, and justice.
