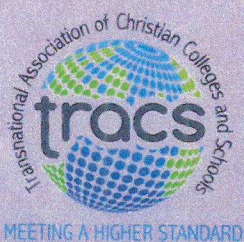

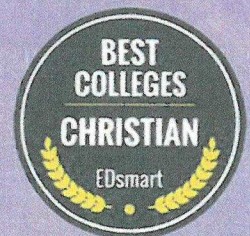

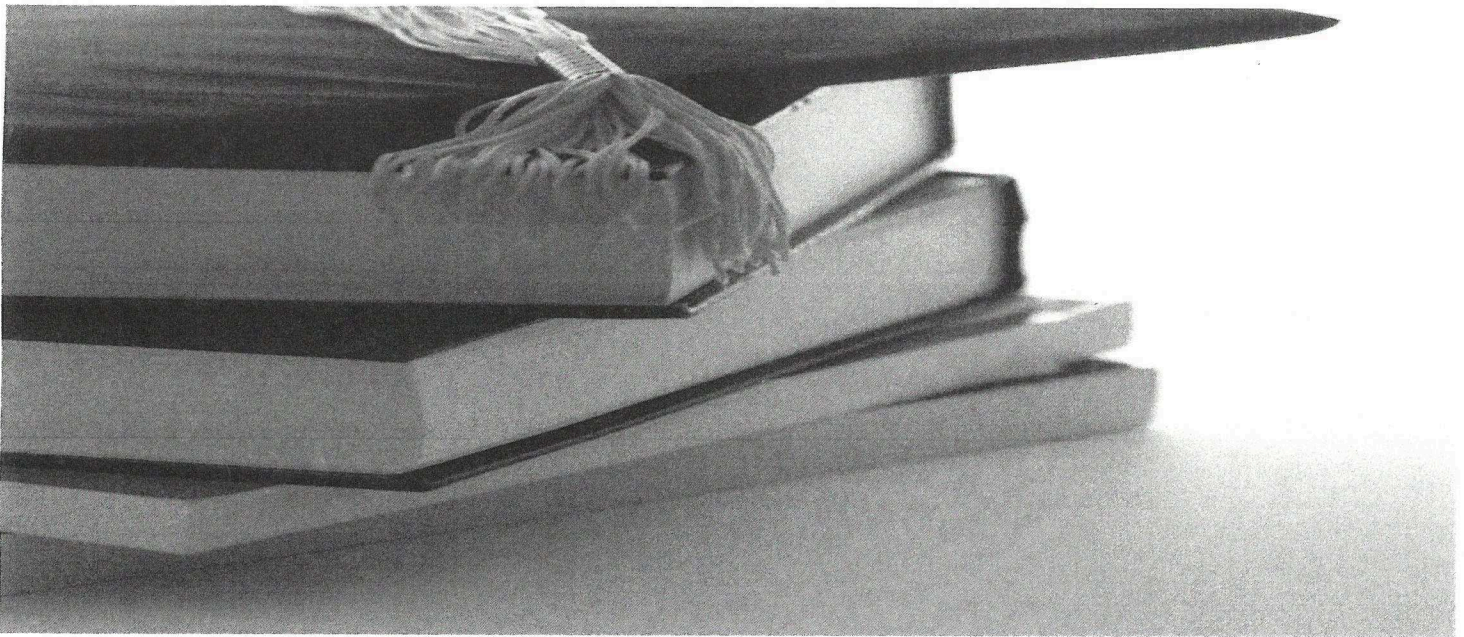

English Composition, World History, Psychology and Sociology

ENG 101

Composition I – Composition I focuses on developing skills required for effective writing in a variety of contexts in academic and professional writing. Students in English 101 will write a five-paragraph expository college-level essay with three developmental paragraphs that support a thesis statement, contain appropriate concrete details and examples, and demonstrate competency in standard English within a specified time. A review of grammar, usage, and mechanics is included. A grade of “C” or better is required to pass this course. (3 Credit hours)

World History – Survey of world civilizations from pre-historic times to the present. (3 Credit hours)

PSY 201

Introduction to Psychology – This is a broad survey course covering basic concepts and research findings related to topics such as: scientific methodology; biological bases of behavior, development; perception, motivation, and emotion; learning and memory; intelligence; personality; psychological disturbance and social influence. (3 Credit hours)

SOC 201

Introduction to Sociology – The course is concerned with social behavior, social institutions, and with the characteristics of sociology as a discipline. It introduces classic sociological theories. Students become familiar with the use of such basic concepts in sociology as norms, values, roles, socialization, stratification, power and authority, deviance and control, social conflict, and social change. It exposes students to perspectives, methods, and concepts used in contemporary sociology, with special emphasis on developing a sociological imagination as it pertains to issues of diversity and globalization in the modern world. (3 Credit hours)
