Bud, Not Buddy

As we read the novel, Bud, Not Buddy, we learned how important Bud's suitcase full of personal treasures is to him. These items remind him of who he is and where he came from. You are going to make a connection to our text with this project!

Packing Your Suitcase Project

What would you put in your suitcase if you were Bud?

You will be creating your version of a suitcase, making sure to put the most important things to you inside of it. Inside your suitcase, you will include <u>ONLY 5</u> things that are the most important to you. You can take a picture of the item and print it, draw, use clipart, or take pictures from a magazine. These pictures can be mounted on heavier paper.

Part One: Make a "Suitcase" and the 5 things you would put in your suitcase.

Materials:

- Cereal box or shoe box
- Plain paper to cover the cereal box. (Ex. Brown, black, white, etc.)
- Crayons, markers, stickers, glue (any art supplies that you would like to use).
- Some cardboard, or an index card, to create a handle for your suitcase.
- Magazine pictures, clipart, take a picture and print it, or draw and color pictures of your 5 most important things.
- Large Index Card

Paragraph Structure:

- Topic Sentence
- At least 5 detail sentences
- Conclusion sentence

<u>Part Two</u>: Written response (essay).

- You will write a summary of the novel (on a large index card) and attach it to the back of the suitcase.
- You will write a response based on your choices for your suitcase.

With <u>EACH ITEM</u>, you must complete a paragraph (A fifth Grade paragraph that is about $\frac{1}{2}$ a page written, at <u>least</u> 5 sentences) answering the following questions:

- 1. What is the item you have chosen to include?
- 2. Why is this item so special to you?
- 3. Why would you not want to be without this special treasure?
- 4. How does this item represent who you are or where you came from?
- 5. What connection can you make between Bud and his important items from his suitcase?



Your completed <u>suitcase</u>, <u>5 items</u>, and your paragraphs are all <u>due by Monday</u>, <u>March 11th</u>. If you finish before that date, you can bring it in early.

*You will present your project and read your papers to the class/teacher.
