Our Story:

Richmond Hill K-8 is continuing for the 2020-2021 School Year! Students at Richmond Hill K-8 come from various schools in the South Augusta Community. Students in Kindergarten through 5th Grade attend our school based on NPU changes, revised attendance zones, and closing schools. These students have previously attended Roy Rollins Elementary School, Windsor Spring Elementary School, and Southside Elementary School. Students in Grades 6-8 are enrolled in Richmond Hill K-8 based on NPU changes, revised attendance zones, and closing schools. These students have previously attended Morgan Road Middle School, Murphey Middle School, and Glenn Hills Middle School.

Our Points of Pride:

- We are a 1:1 school. Students in Kindergarten through 2nd Grade have iPads for individual use during the instructional day. Students in Grades 3-8 have laptops for individual use during the instructional day and for use at home for school-related work.
- We have TWO STEM Labs.
- We have TWO Computer Labs.
- We have the state-of-the-art technology throughout each classroom for enhancement to student engagement.
- We have a Collaborative Learning Room/Makerspace that will easily accommodate two full classes of students.
- Middle School sports: Baseball, Basketball (boys' and girls' teams), cheerleading, football, golf, and track & field (boys' and girls' teams).
- Interventions are embedded within the curriculum to further support students' learning needs.

Our CCRPI stats:

College and Career Ready Performance Index (CCRPI) is Georgia's statewide accountability system. The CCRPI assesses how well students are prepared for college and careers and ensures that schools are focused on improving achievement among all students. The index measures progress on indicators such as content mastery, student attendance, and preparation for the next school level. Schools earn CCRPI points based on indicators that vary by grade and school level and align with measures of college- and career-readiness. Schools may earn up to a set number of points in five main categories, for a total of 100 possible points. In 2019-2020, statewide accountability was suspended due to COVID-19 closures.
