What can you do to prepare your child for first grade?

### 1. Make sure your child knows how to tie his/her own shoes.

- 2. Practice the provided word list. Your child will be tested on these words at the beginning of the year.
- 3. Keep working on letter names and sounds throughout the summer. First grade students should know all 52 upper- and lower-case letters and their sounds at the start of the year.
- 4. Encourage your child to sit and listen. We give our students plenty of opportunities to move and talk. It is imperative that they also sit and listen when it is appropriate.
- 5. Handwriting! We need to be able to read your child's handwriting.
- 6. Please teach your student his/her full name, address, phone number, and birthday.
- 7. Practice counting and identifying numbers to 100.
- 8. Complete the summer work.
- 9. Practice math and reading skills using iReady or other online programs (abcya, mathplayground, etc.).

# 1<sup>st</sup> Grade Summer Scrapbook


Summer is a special time for children to have many learning adventures. Your child's 1<sup>st</sup> grade summer assignment is to create a scrapbook documenting these adventures. The scrapbook should be handmade, so please no store bought scrapbooks. You can help your child make a scrapbook using construction paper, scrapbook paper, or any other fun paper. Your child should create a cover for the scrapbook that includes a title. Be creative and have fun!

The **Summer Scrapbook Choice Board** is attached. Activities in the first column are required. Your child should select at least two activities from each of the other four columns. Each activity should be documented in the scrapbook. This can be done through writing, illustrations, and/or photographs. Please note that if an activity requires writing, the written activity should be included in the scrapbook. For example, when your child writes his/her address, the paper on which it is written should be a page in the scrapbook. This project will be graded and used for the first oral presentation. <u>All writing should be completed by the student.</u>
