### What is Title I?

- ▶ **Title I**, Part A (**Title I**) of the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) provides financial assistance to local educational agencies (LEAs) and schools with high numbers or high percentages of children from low-income families to help ensure that all children meet challenging state academic standards.
- Schools operate two types of Title I programs-
- \* Targeted Assistance- Serves a select group of students based on the most "at-risk" factors
- \* School Wide- Everyone regardless of need benefits and receives Title I support.



# Parent and Family Engagement Policies (LEA & Schools)

In order to receive Title I funds, districts must conduct outreach to parents and family members and must implement <a href="programs">programs</a>, <a href="activities">activities</a> and procedures for the involvement of parents and families in Title I funded activities. Each district must jointly develop with and distribute to families, in a language they can understand, a written parent and family engagement policy. The engagement policy must be periodically updated to reflect the needs of families and be incorporated into the district plans described above. Title I-receiving schools in the district must also distribute parent and family engagement policies agreed to by the parents.



### LEA Parent and Family Engagement Policy

- School Districts: The district parent and family engagement policy must describe how the district will:
  - Involve parents in the joint <u>development</u> of the district plan;
  - Provide the support necessary to assist schools in implementing <u>effective family engagement</u> activities;
  - Conduct an annual evaluation of the effectiveness of the policy in improving the academic quality of Title I schools, including identifying barriers to greater participation by families, (especially family members who are economically disadvantaged, disabled, have limited English proficiency, have limited literacy, or are a racial or ethnic minority) and use the findings to design strategies to support successful school and family interactions and revise engagement policies; and
  - Involve families in <u>schools activities</u>, which may include establishing an advisory board to develop, revise and review the engagement policy.



### **SCHOOL Parent and Family Engagement Policy**

#### Title I Schools:

The school parents and family engagement policy must describe how the school will:

- Convene an annual meeting, at a convenient time to which all parents of low-income students are invited and encouraged to attend, to <u>inform parents</u> that their school receives Title I funds, that these funds come with requirements, and that parents have a right to be involved;
- Offer a flexible number of engagement <u>meetings</u> at convenient times for families (for which the school may provide transportation, child care, or home visits using Title I funds);
- Provide parents and families with:
  - Information about Title I-funded programs;
  - An explanation of the curriculum and achievement levels the school uses; and
  - If requested, opportunities for regular meetings to participate in decisions relating to the education of their student.

#### What is Title I?

Spirit Creek Middle School is identified as a Title I school as part of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965 (ESEA). Title I is designed to support State and local school reform efforts tied to challenging state academic standards in reinforce and enhance efforts to improve teaching and learning for students. Title I programs must be based on effective means of improving student achievement and include strategies to support parental involvement. All Title I schools must jointly develop with all parents a written parental involvement policy.

#### What is it?

This is a plan that describes how Spirit Creek will provide opportunities to improve parent engagement to support student learning. Spirit Creek values the contributions and involvement of parents to establish an equal partnership for the common goal of improving student achievement. #### How is it revised?

Spirit Creek invited all parents, teachers, students, and community stakeholders to attend our Input and revision meeting this fall to review and revise this parental involvement policy, as well as the schoolwide plan, our school-parent compact, parent survey, and the parental involvement budget. Additionally, stakeholder input and comments regarding this plan are welcome during the school year through an online form. The plan is posted on our school website for stakeholders to view and submit feedback throughout the year. All feedback received during the year will be used to revise the plan for the next school year. We also distribute an annual survey online and it is sent home by students to ask stakeholders for their suggestions on the plan and the use of funds for parental involvement. Parents/stakeholders can also give feedback during several parent meetings and activities during the school year.

#### Who is it for?

All students participating in the Title I, Part A program, and their families, are encouraged and invited to fully participate in the opportunities described in this plan. Spirit Creek will provide full opportunity for the participation of parents with limited English, parents with disabilities and parents of migratory children.

#### Where is it available?

In the fall after the input revision meeting, the Annual Title I meeting will be held and the plan will be distributed; it will also be posted on the school web site, sent home with students, and parents can also retrieve a copy of the plan in the Parent Resource Center.

### Title I Funds

#### **Title I Parent and Family Engagement Set:**

### **Building Capacity**


- Each year schools must provide 4 building capacity sessions for staff and parents.
