Proving the Opposite Sides Criterion for a Parallelogram

You can prove that a quadrilateral is a parallelogram by using the definition of a parallelogram. That is, you can show that both pairs of opposite sides are parallel. However, there are other conditions that also guarantee that a quadrilateral is a parallelogram.

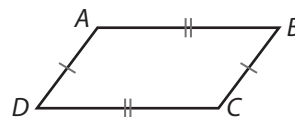
Theorem

If both pairs of opposite sides of a quadrilateral are congruent, then the quadrilateral is a parallelogram.

Complete the proof of the theorem.

Given: $\overline{AB} \cong \overline{CD}$ and $\overline{AD} \cong \overline{CB}$

Prove: $ABCD$ is a parallelogram.

It is possible to combine the theorem from the Explore and the definition of a parallelogram to state the following condition for proving a quadrilateral is a parallelogram. You will prove this in the exercises.

Theorem

If one pair of opposite sides of a quadrilateral are parallel and congruent, then the quadrilateral is a parallelogram.

Proving the Opposite Angles Criterion for a Parallelogram

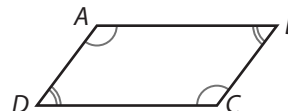
You can use relationships between angles to prove that a quadrilateral is a parallelogram.

Theorem

If both pairs of opposite angles of a quadrilateral are congruent, then the quadrilateral is a parallelogram.

- Example 1** Prove that a quadrilateral is a parallelogram if its opposite angles are congruent.

Given: $\angle A \cong \angle C$ and $\angle B \cong \angle D$ Prove: $ABCD$ is a parallelogram.



$m\angle A + m\angle B + m\angle C + m\angle D = 360^\circ$ by _____.

From the given information, $m\angle A = m\angle$ and $m\angle B = m\angle$. By substitution,

$m\angle A + m\angle D + m\angle A + m\angle D = 360^\circ$ or $2m\angle$ + $2m\angle$ = 360° . Dividing

both sides by 2 gives _____. Therefore, $\angle A$ and $\angle D$ are

supplementary and so $\overline{AB} \parallel \overline{DC}$ by the _____.

A similar argument shows that $\overline{AD} \parallel \overline{BC}$, so $ABCD$ is a parallelogram

🔑 Explain 2 Proving the Bisecting Diagonals Criterion for a Parallelogram

You can use information about the diagonals in a given figure to show that the figure is a parallelogram.

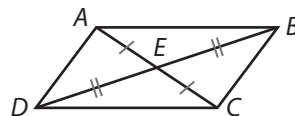
Theorem

If the diagonals of a quadrilateral bisect each other, then the quadrilateral is a parallelogram.

Example 2 Prove that a quadrilateral whose diagonals bisect each other is a parallelogram.

Given: $\overline{AE} \cong \overline{CE}$ and $\overline{DE} \cong \overline{BE}$

Prove: $ABCD$ is a parallelogram.



Statements	Reasons
1. $\overline{AE} \cong \overline{CE}, \overline{DE} \cong \overline{BE}$	1.
2. $\angle AEB \cong \angle CED, \angle AED \cong \angle CEB$	2.

4. $\overline{AB} \cong \overline{CD}, \overline{AD} \cong \overline{CB}$	4.
5. $ABCD$ is a parallelogram.	5.

🔑 Explain 3 Using a Parallelogram to Prove the Concurrency of the Medians of a Triangle

Sometimes properties of one type of geometric figure can be used to recognize properties of another geometric figure. Recall that you explored triangles and found that the medians of a triangle are concurrent at a point that is $\frac{2}{3}$ of the distance from each vertex to the midpoint of the opposite side. You can prove this theorem using one of the conditions for a parallelogram from this lesson.

Example 3 Complete the proof of the Concurrency of Medians of a Triangle Theorem.

Given: $\triangle ABC$

Prove: The medians of $\triangle ABC$ are concurrent at a point that is $\frac{2}{3}$ of the distance from each vertex to the midpoint of the opposite side.

Let $\triangle ABC$ be a triangle such that M is the midpoint of $\overline{AB}$ and N is the midpoint of $\overline{BC}$. Label the point where the two medians intersect as P . Draw $\overline{MN}$.

$\overline{MN}$ is a midsegment of $\triangle ABC$ because it connects the midpoints of two sides of the triangle.

$\overline{MN}$ is parallel to _____ and $MN = \frac{1}{2} \overline{AC}$ by the Triangle Midsegment Theorem.

Let Q be the midpoint of $\overline{PA}$ and let R be the midpoint of $\overline{PC}$.

Draw $\overline{QR}$.

$\overline{QR}$ is a midsegment of $\triangle APC$ because it connects the midpoints of two sides of the triangle.

$\overline{QR}$ is parallel to _____ and $QR = \frac{1}{2} \overline{AC}$ by the Triangle Midsegment Theorem.

So, you can conclude that $MN = \frac{1}{2} \overline{AC}$ by substitution and that

$\overline{MN} \parallel \overline{QR}$ because _____.

Now draw $\overline{MQ}$ and $\overline{NR}$ and consider quadrilateral $MQRN$.

Quadrilateral $MQRN$ is a parallelogram because _____.

Since the diagonals of a parallelogram bisect each other, then $QP = \frac{1}{2} \overline{AN}$.

Also, $AQ = QP$ since _____.

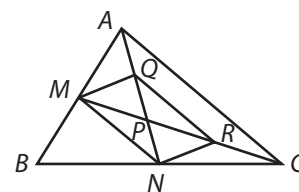
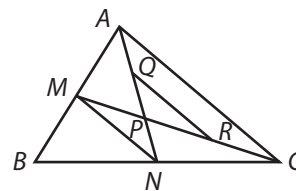
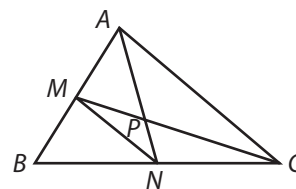
Therefore, $AQ = QP = \frac{1}{3} \overline{AN}$. This shows that point P is located on $\overline{AN}$ at a point that is $\frac{2}{3}$ of the distance from A to N .

By similar reasoning, the diagonals of a parallelogram bisect each other, so $RP = \frac{1}{2} \overline{CM}$.

Also, $CR = RP$ since _____.

Therefore, $CR = RP = \frac{1}{3} \overline{CM}$. This shows that point P is located on $\overline{CM}$ at a point that is $\frac{2}{3}$ of the distance from C to M .

You can repeat the proof using any two medians of $\triangle ABC$. The same reasoning shows that the medians from vertices B and C intersect at a point that is also $\frac{2}{3}$ of the distance from C to M , so this point must also be point P . This shows that the three medians intersect at a unique point P and that the point is $\frac{2}{3}$ of the distance from each vertex to the midpoint of the opposite side.

Explain 4 Verifying Figures Are Parallelograms

You can use information about sides, angles, and diagonals in a given figure to show that the figure is a parallelogram.

Example 4 Show that each quadrilateral is a parallelogram for the given values of the variables.

- (A) $x = 7$ and $y = 4$

Step 1 Find BC and DA .

$$BC = x + 14 = 7 + 14 = 21$$

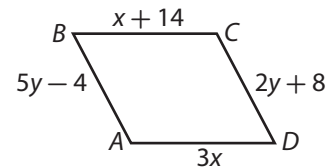
$$DA = 3x = 3(7) = 21$$

Step 2 Find AB and CD .

$$AB = 5y - 4 = 5(4) - 4 = 16$$

$$CD = 2y + 8 = 2(4) + 8 = 16$$

So, $BC = DA$ and $AB = CD$. $ABCD$ is a parallelogram since both pairs of opposite sides are congruent.



- (B) $z = 11$ and $w = 4.5$

Step 1 Find $m\angle F$ and $m\angle H$.

$$m\angle F = \underline{\hspace{2cm}} = \underline{\hspace{2cm}}$$

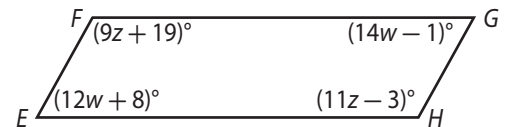

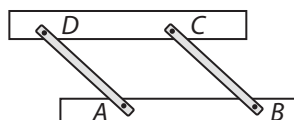
14. **Critical Thinking** Jasmina said that you can draw a parallelogram using the following steps.
