Dear Goshen Elementary School Families,

Richmond County School System considers the health and well-being of our students, teachers, and staff to be of the utmost importance. With that in mind, this letter is being sent home for your information. Goshen Elementary School has been impacted by an increase in COVID-19 related staff absences.

As a result, Goshen Elementary School will transition to Learn@Home instruction beginning Thursday, January 13, 2022. Students will return to school on Tuesday, January 18, 2022 following the Martin Luther King, Jr. Holiday.

Learn@Home instructions are being sent home with your student today. During this transition, teachers will support instruction and learning. Students will be considered present for the Learn@Home period as long as all assignments are completed.

Meals will be available for pickup from the side entrance of the school cafeteria from 8:00am -2:00pm on Thursday, January 13 and Friday, January 14.

If you have not received notification that your child has had direct contact with a positive COVID-19 case, they are not required to quarantine or isolate. We continue to work closely with local public health officials to ensure current recommendations are followed to act in the best interest of our students, teachers and staff.

SEQUOYALI

Sequoyah was born around 1776 in Tuskegee, Tennessee. His mother was a Cherokee Indian and his father a white man. Sequoyah grew up in a Cherokee village in Tennessee with his mother. He did not go to school, so he was never taught to read and write. He only spoke the Cherokee language. Sequoyah spent his time helping his mother working the garden and taking care of livestock.

Sequoyah was hurt in a hunting accident when he was a young man. He couldn't help with hunting or livestock, so he taught himself to be a silversmith. A silversmith is someone who makes things from silver and other metals. He made jewelry out of silver and tools from iron. As a silversmith, Sequoyah (who also went by George Guess as an adult) spent a lot of time communicating with white people. He learned that they could communicate on paper over long distances by using symbols on paper.

Sequoyah was very curious about the "talking leaves" that he saw people read from. The "talking leaves," as Sequoyah called them, were books. He wanted to figure out how to make a way to read and write his own Cherokee language. In 1809, Sequoyah began the creation of a Cherokee alphabet. He began to draw a symbol for each word in the Cherokee language. He realized that would be too many symbols to remember, so he created a symbol for each syllable in the Cherokee language. After over ten years of hard work, Sequoyah had formed a syllabary, an alphabet based on syllables, with 86 symbols. The 86 symbols of the Cherokee alphabet covered every sound in the Cherokee language.

In 1821, Sequoyah shared his Cherokee alphabet with the Cherokee

Council. It took some convincing on Sequoyah's part, but his alphabet was accepted! Cherokee Indians began reading and writing in their own language within only a few years. Books and newspapers were printed in Cherokee. Sequoyah traveled around for many years teaching and sharing the Cherokee alphabet with other Cherokee Indians. Sequoyah is believed to have died in 1843 in Mexico.

Sequoyah became a hero to the Cherokee people. There is a statue of Sequoyah in the U.S. Capitol in Washington, D.C. and in the Oklahoma. Capitol building. The cabin in Oklahoma where Sequoyah lived is now a U.S. National Historic Landmark. Sequoia trees were named in his honor as well as Sequoia National Park.






