### Required Reading: The Outsiders by S.E. Hinton

- 1. S.E. Hinton's <u>The Outsiders</u> is about two weeks in the life of a 14-year-old boy. The novel tells the story of Ponyboy Curtis and his struggles with right and wrong in a society in which he believes that he is an outsider. S.E. Hinton first published The Outsiders in 1967 by Viking Press. Since then, the book has sold upwards of 15 million copies, become a steady feature on middle school reading lists, and inspired an award winning Francis Ford Coppola film of the same name.
- 2. Assignment: Read, annotate the novel, <u>The Outsiders</u>, and answer the chapter questions. In order for you to actively read and connect with the text, we require you to purchase a copy. It is available at Barnes & Noble (at the mall and online); you can also purchase used copies from Second and Charles on Washington Road or from Amazon.com. Write down your thoughts as you read through the book. Do NOT summarize the book.
