2016-2017 School Profile and Special Programs

School and Community

In 1963, a small group of committed citizens of Augusta decided that the new school should be named for the late Dr. Thomas Walter Josey, and should have as its motto, "Power Through Knowledge". In addition, this group chose the colors Kelly green (power), gold (knowledge), and white (purity) as the school's colors. The eagle (a bird of might) was chosen as the mascot. We very proudly called ourselves the Thomas Walter Josey High School.

Josey is located in Augusta which is the second largest and oldest city in Georgia. Augusta is best known as the Garden City and home of the Masters Golf Tournament. RCSS operates 58 schools and serves over 30,000 students. RCSS has an International Baccalaureate Programs, top-rated magnet schools and programs, specialized curricula such as STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) and arts infusion, and technology rich classrooms.

Class Rank and Grade Point Average

An official class rank is compiled for each grade that is computed at the end of the year. Averages are carried out to three decimal places and final averages are not rounded. Grades for the class of 2016 and 2017 are unweighted. Student's grade point average (GPA) will be based on quality points beginning with the graduating class of 2018. Regular high school courses will be on a 4.0 scale and AP, IB and College/University Courses on a 5.0 scale awarded for each grade earned. High school student transcripts include the GPA, class rank and numerical average.

General Information

T.W. Josey is a four year public comprehensive high school with an emphasis on college and career readiness. T.W. Josey offers Advance Placement Courses, Fine Arts and CTAE electives to all students. Students who are selected for the AVID Program (Advancement Via Individual Determination) receive additional academic and social support that will help them rise to the challenges of Post-Secondary Education. Our teachers provide research-based curriculum and strategies to students each day that develop critical thinking skills in literacy and math.

College and Career Ready Performance Index (CCRPI)

College and Career Ready Performance Index (CCRPI) is Georgia's statewide accountability system. The CCRPI assesses how well students are prepared for college and careers and ensures that schools are focused on improving achievement among all students. The index measures progress on indicators such as content mastery, student attendance, and preparation for the next school level. Schools earn CCRPI points based on indicators that vary by grade and school level and align with measures of college- and career-readiness. Schools may earn up to a set number of points in three main categories, for a total of 100 possible points.
