The IB Action Cycle

The IB Action Cycle is a framework that encourages students to take action based on their learning, experiences, and understanding of the world. The Action Cycle consists of three stages: choosing an issue, taking action, and reflecting. In the first stage, students identify an issue that is important to them, and they explore the causes and potential solutions. In the second stage, students take action on the issue, either individually or as part of a group. This action could be anything from raising awareness to implementing a solution. Finally, in the third stage, students reflect on their action, evaluating its effectiveness and considering how they might approach the issue differently in the future.



The Action Cycle is a key component of the IB philosophy, and it encourages students to become active, responsible, and engaged global citizens. Agency

Student agency refers to the ability of students to take ownership of their learning, make choices, and take responsibility for their actions. Ways Parents Can Help Students to be Thinker at Home

- 1. Encourage your child to engage in pretend play, children are naturally curious and imaginative.
- 2. Pause and wait...give your child time to think for him/herself, be patient.
- 3. Don't intervene immediately, it's okay to let your child explore on their own.
- 4. Ask open-ended questions.
- 5. Help children develop hypotheses.
- 6. Encourage critical thinking in new and different ways.
- 7. Encourage your child to retell stories, put on plays with story props.
- 8. Leave time for unstructured play.
- 9. Encourage your child to play and explore outside.
- 10. Encourage Creative Thinking.
- 11. Let your child experience failure, and then let him/her figure out how to turn their failure into a positive learning experience.
- 12. Provide opportunities to visit Children's Museums and Libraries.

Ways Students Can Practice Agency Over the Summer

There are many ways that students can continue to practice student agency and take ownership of their learning during the summer months. One strategy is to pursue personal interests and passions through independent reading, research, or creative projects.
