General Info

- NO multiple choice questions
- AP Literature Exams will have a single 45-minute essay
 - FRQ # 2 for AP English—PROSE

Challenges for at home testing-- <https://apcoronavirusupdates.collegeboard.org/students/taking-ap-exams>

- Question types are familiar—can create a false sense of security
- Without proctor—students have to keep track themselves, therefore, **WATCH THE CLOCK!!!**
- Students can turn off timer on the exam, but I encourage you to keep it on—when the 45 minutes are up, **that's it.**
- If material is not submitted within the time limit, College Board cannot score it.
- Option to handwrite, take a photo or upload, **HOWEVER**—this eats into your time. Type it if you can.
- Choose to type and upload typed responses
 - AP Live classes will provide information, practice, and examples! (already doing that!)—there will be live simulations to practice before the exam—**IT IS IMPERATIVE THAT YOU DO THIS BEFORE THE ACTUAL EXAM**

Security Measures

- May not consult with other students
- Can look at notes/rubrics
- Use internet searches
- Use textbooks
- Cannot consult with other students or teachers
- No logic for cheating...strong principles and moral values are expected
- No group chats...no group phone calls....no social media...do not use someone else. They are using software to track these things.
- Protocols are in place to determine whether or not cheating occurs—**COLLEGE BOARD HAS SPENT MILLIONS OF DOLLARS FOR THESE SECURITY MEASURES.** So much so, they will not even reveal all of them to us—to teachers. Be honest and do your best—this is not the time to try and challenge them.
 - Examples of A FEW measures being taken (even more are in place that are confidential):
 - To access the exam, you will be completing several steps and answering several questions that will filter through impersonation attempts
 - Can detect patterns for the way they write...impersonation fraud is detected!
 - Can identify whether it belongs to the student or not
 - Consequences from the College Board will be severe—very.
 - Responses will be scanned by plagiarism software
 - Reported to EVERY college if you do cheat (and they will find you)

- Could a student use more than one device to test?
 - NO. You need to choose one device. Your most reliable, least distracting option. (i.e. a laptop, NOT a phone).
 - There will be instructions if a student wants to use a phone to take a picture.
 - Pick a situation—handwriting - use cellphone. Typing - use desktop/laptop. Remember, the clock will be ticking!!!
- Opportunity to practice?
 - Big unknown is testing by yourself...at home. Challenge.
 - AP Live will be providing students simulations in which they can practice.
 - There will be print instructions, videos, the Live videos will coach, and they are planning to conduct a simulation
 - At home testing guide will be provided...information found.
 - Extended testing time (automatically extended if already granted)
 - For 45 essay...automatic
 - Delineated in testing guide
- Rubrics for exams
 - The questions are the SAME ones students have been working with
- College Credit & Consideration
 - Every 4 year college is a member with CB and votes/communicates with staff
